Petersburg, October 12 We received Yesterday the agreeable News of her Imperial Majesty's Coronation on the 3d Instant, at Moscow, and that the Ceremony was conducted with the greatest Order and Magnificence.

There were several Promotions upon that Occasion, the Particulars of which are not exactly known, except that the Three Brothers Orloff are created Counts; and it is further said, the Court is to return hither this Winter.

Hague, November 5. A Courier is just arrived here, from Saxony, with the News of a complete Victory obtained the 29th past, near Freyberg, by Prince Henry of Prussia, over the United Armies of Austrians and Imperialists, under the Command of the Prince de Stolberg, in the Absence of General Haddick, who was gone to Dresden. His Royal Highness attacked the Enemy at Day-break, and the Action lasted till Two in the Afternoon, when the Enemy was entirely routed, and obliged to quit the Field of Battle, and the Town of Freyberg, to the Prussians; who took besides from 5 to 6000 Prisoners, 30 Cannons, and several Colours and Standards. What made the Circumstances of this Battle, according to the above Account, so much the more glorious, were, that Prince Henry had with him a Part only of his Troops; the Corps under General Hulsen having only made some Movements to facilitate the Operations of his Royal Highness; and the Reinforcement under the Count de Neuwid having gotten no farther the Day of the Battle than the Neighbourhood of Grossenhayn.

Some Letters from Tarreda, the Spanish Camp in the Kingdom of Portugal, dated the 13th past, mention, that the Difficulty of making the Roads passable for their Artillery, and the great Scarcity of Forage between that Place and Abrantes, kept them still in the same Situation, having Villa Velha on their Left, Sebreia Formosa in the Front, and the Main Body of their Army at Tarreda.

St. James's, November 12.

This Day arrived here Capt. Guddickens, sent Express by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, to His Majesty, with the News of the Surrender of Cassel to Prince Ferdinand, on the 1st Instant, upon the following Articles of Capitulation.

Article I. The Garrison shall go out with the Honours of War, their Arms, and Baggages, Drums beating, lighted Match, to be conducted by the nearest Road to the King's Army.

Granted. Thursday Morning.

Art. II. The Sick from the Hospitals, with the Effects thereto belonging, shall have free Liberty to depart, and Carriages or Boats shall be furnished them gratis for this Evacuation, as the Sick and Wounded shall be in Condition to be transported to the King's Army.

The Hospitals may have free Liberty to go out with their Effects, but the Carriages shall not be furnished gratis.

Art. III. The Artillery, and all the Royal Effects, shall be transported to the King's Army by Boats or Carriages of the Country gratis.

No. In Favour of the gallant Defence, I grant two Pieces of Cannon, 12 Pounders, and one 4 Pounder, for Baron Diesbach, Commandant of Cassel.

Art. IV. Covered Carriages and Boats shall be furnished, to transport the Equipages, and Agents, which shall not be visited.

Granted.

Art. V. The Treasurer of the Troops, the Agent Victuallers, and others, shall go out with their Effects and Papers, without any Impediment.

Granted.

Art. VI. The Garrison shall be furnished with Bread, Provision, and Forage, every one gratis, according to his Rank, till their Arrival at the King's Army.

The Garrison shall provide themselves with Bread, and Forage, but shall pay for it on their March.

Art. VII. All the Effects, belonging to the King's Officers and Troops, may be freely carried off with them, or sent after them.

Granted.

Art. VIII. When the Capitulation shall be signed, Leave shall be given to send an Officer to the Marshals to acquaint them with it.

Granted.

Art. IX. The Garrison shall be escorted by a proper Detachment.

Granted.

Art. X. The Boatmen too, Victuallers, and other Subjects of the King, shall have free Liberty of going out with their Effects, on paying the Debts they may have contracted in the City.

Granted.

Art. III. Every Kind of Assistance, that shall be demanded by his most Christian Majesty's Commissary, who has the Government of the Hospital, shall be furnished to them.

Art. IV. The Effects, Provisions, and Medicines, shall be left for the King's Profit.

Granted.

Art. V. The Carriages necessary for conveying the Sick, and their Effects, to the King's Army, by the shortest Road, shall be furnished.

Granted.

Art. VI. No Damage shall be done to the Agents, Commissaries and Surgeons, who will be to remain, in order to take Care of the Sick after the Garrison shall have evacuated the Place.
