Hambourg, November 9.

WE hear from Berlin, that the King of Prussia was to cross the Elbe at Torgau as the 6th Instant, with Fifteen Battalions, in order to reinforce Prince Henry's Army in Saxony, and to endeavour to dislodge the Enemy from that Electorate, before he ends the Campaign. His Prussian Majesty has left the Command of his Army in Silesia, during his Absence, to the Prince of Bevern.

The Number of Prisoners, which his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia made at the Battle of the 20th past near Freyberg, over a Combined Army of Austrians and Troops of the Empire, commanded by the Prince of Stolberg, consists in one Lieutenant General, Baron de Rodt; one Colonel, one Major, twenty-four Captains, forty one Lieutenants, and eleven Ensigns, and four thousand one hundred and seventy-four private Men, besides one hundred and fifty-nine under Officers. The Artillery taken is, twenty-seven Pieces of Cannon, with nine Standards and Colours.
