Constantinople, September 20. Another very dangerous Fire broke out last Week, which threatened Destruction to the whole Quarter of the Franks at Pera. The English Palace happily standing free, and detached on all Sides, remained unhurt; but some of the English Merchants have lost their Houses, and not having Time to save their Effects, are become considerable Sufferers.
