LES Protestans François Refugeés croiroient manquer à leur Devoir, si à l'Occasion d'un Evènement aussi important que celui de la Naissance d'un Prince de Galles, & qui interesse si particulièrement le Bonheur de la Nation, aussi bien que celui de la Cause Protestante, ils ne venoient témoigner à votre Majesté la Part qu'ils prennent à l'Allegresse publique.

Cet Evènement, Sire, quand on l'envise dans l'Avenir, joint aux Prosperités éclatantes par lesquelles il a plu à Dieu de distinguer les Commencemens du Regne de votre Majesté, ne peut que remplir tout Coeur Protestant de la Joye la plus vive.
