The Advices from the Army of the 20th, as fent by the Marshal Count de la Lippe, from Lord Loudoun, and from General Townshend, all agree in the Enemy's having entirely evacuated the Province of Estremadura. And Letters of the fame Date, from Lord George Lenox at Guarda mention, That his Lordship had certain Intelligence, that the Spaniards had blown up the Walls of Castello Rodrigo, and were mining those of Castello Borri, as they have done those of Almeida, feemingly with the fame Intent.

Lord George Lenox is at Guarda, as above ; Colonel Hamilton, with his Regiment of Light Horfe, is at St. Vicente de Beira ; Lieutenant General Townfhend, at Pamphilhofa upon the River Zizare ; the Earl of Loudoun, with four Englift Regiments, at St. Domingo ; and the Marfhal Count de la Lippe at Sardoal, a few Leagues from Abrantes. Brigadier Burgoyne remains in the fame Pofition between Niffa and Vilha Velha. This is the prefent Situation of the Army. But it is locked upon in general, that the Campaign is over for the Winter, the Enemy not being able to make any Progrefs in this Seafon, through fuch a mountainous Country.
