*Lisbon, October 27.* The Surprise of the Spanish Cavalry at Vilha Velha, on the 6th Instant, effectually defeated the Scheme the Enemy had of passing over the Tagus into the Province of Alemtejo; and the heavy Rains, which have since fallen, have obliged them to retire from Castello Branco, and repass the Mountains which separate the Provinces of Estremadura, and Beira. The Advices from the Army of the 20th, as sent by the Marshal Count de la Lippe, from Lord Loudoun, and from General Townshend, all agree in the Enemy's having entirely evacuated the Province of Estremadura. And Letters of the same Date, from Lord George Lenox at Guarda mention, That his Lordship had certain Intelligence, that the Spaniards had blown up the Walls of Castello Rodrigo, and were mining those of Castello Borri, as they have done those of Almeida, seemingly with the same Intent.

Lord George Lenox is at Guarda, as above; Colonel Hamilton, with his Regiment of Light Horse, is at St. Vicente de Beira; Lieutenant General Townshend, at Pamphilhosá upon the River Zizare; the Earl of Loudoun, with four English Regiments, at St. Domingo; and the Marshal Count de la Lippe at Sardoal, a few Leagues from Abrantes. Brigadier Burgoyne remains in the same Position between Nissa and Vilha Velha. This is the present Situation of the Army. But it is looked upon in general, that the Campaign is over for the Winter, the Enemy not being able to make any Progress in this Season, through such a mountainous Country.

*Breslau, November 3.* His Prussian Majesty was on the 2d at Lauenberg, in his Way, as is believed, to

to join the Army in Saxony. Marshal Daun, it is said, still remains with Part of his Army at Scharf-  
rick in the County of Glatz, having sent a con-  
siderable Corps into the Higher Silesia, and made  
large Detachments into Saxony. The Duke of  
Bevern commands the Prussian Army in Silesia,  
which consists of Forty-four Battalions and Seven-  
teen Squadrons, and forms a Chain in the Moun-  
tains from Steinfelsseridoff to Bandorff. Part of  
the Cavalry is in the Plain.

General Verner is sent with a small Corps into  
the Higher Silesia.

*Extract of a Letter from the Prussian Camp at  
Veightsdorff, November 5.*

The 31st of October, Two Days after the Battle  
of Freyberg, the Prince of Stolberg received a Rein-  
forcement of Five Regiments, which joined him at  
Frauenstein, where the Emperor's Army was re-as-  
sembled. Prince Albert of Saxony commanded this  
Reinforcement.

The 1st of this Month Count Neuwied arrived  
at Kaichenhausen and at Meissen, with the Body of  
Troops which he had brought from Silesia into  
Saxon; he took the Position of General Hulsen,  
who joined the Grand Army with his Troops.

The 2d the General Kleist and Platen were de-  
tached in order to alarm the Left Flank of the Enemy  
along the Mulda.

The 3d some Troops were ordered to advance  
to disquiet the Enemy's Center; and Count Neu-  
wied made some Motions proper to draw the Atten-  
tion of General Haddick's Army.

The same Day General Kleist penetrated into Bo-  
hemia by Einsiedel.

The Night between the 3d and 4th, the Enemy  
abandoned their Camp at Frauenstein, which Gen-  
eral Belzig occupied. Prince Henry then took his  
Position between General Hulsen, who remained at  
Freyberg, and General Platen, who pushed forwards  
as far as Potichenstein. General Kleist took Pos-  
session of Saaz, where he took a Captain, two Sub-  
altern Officers, and 400 Soldiers, and destroyed a  
considerable Magazine.

General Effern hovers still about the Mulda, with  
a small Corps. He may perhaps meet with Diffi-  
culty in his Retreat.

The Austrians in Dresden reckon their Loss in all  
ways, in the Action of the 29th past, at Ten Thou-  
sand Men.

*Hague, November 16.* The French Garrison of  
Cassel evacuated that Town on the 4th Instant, and  
have left there Effects, belonging to the French  
King, for a large Sum of Money.

The Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, and his  
Brother Prince Charles, arrived here on Saturday  
last.

By the best Accounts from Spain it appears, that  
their Army in Portugal had been obliged to retire for  
Want of Subsistence, and run great Risk of being  
destroyed by the Overflowing of the Tagus. Both  
the Officers and Private Men are in the most dis-  
tressed Situation, almost without Meat, Drink, or  
Cloaths. The Letters add, that the Spaniards are  
in a worse Condition than the French; and that the  
whole Army was marching towards Estremadura.
