**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 17th of September last, to direct, That the several Bounties therein mentioned, should continue to be paid to every Able and Ordinary Seaman, and Able Bodied Landman, who should voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy on or before the Thirtieth Day of this Instant November: And also, that the Rewards therein mentioned, for discovering Able and Ordinary Seamen, who should secret themselves, should likewise continue to be paid to any Person who should discover such Seamen, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service — His Majesty having this Day taken the said Order into Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, to declare, That the said Bounties and Rewards shall from henceforth cease, determine, and be no longer paid or payable, any Thing therein contained to the Contrary notwithstanding. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.
