This Envoy has accordingly had his Audience of both those Gentlemen.

*Hamburg, November 26.* The Reigning Prince of Anhalt Cothen having notified his Arrival in Town to the Senate, his Highness has been complimented by a Deputation in Form; and it is said, that the Prince intends to make some Stay at this Place.

The Marquis d'Havrincourt, late Ambassador from the Court of France to Sweden, being on his Journey Home, set out from hence the 22d for Holland.

By the last Letters from Berlin we hear, that his Prussian Majesty proposes to be at Hespick the 1st of December.

*Cologne, November 26.* Twenty Battalions and Thirty Squadrons of the Prince of Condé's Division, commanded by the Marquis de Monteynard, separated the 17th from the Army in Hesse, and marched to the Lower Rhine. The Avant Guard arrived here last Wednesday. Yesterday the Head Quarters were in this Town, where they will continue till the 28th, when they will be transferred to Duffeldorff.

The Regiment of Champagne is here; Anhalt, Baviere, and Vierzet, at Wesel; two Battalions of Piedmont at Cleves; one at Calcar, and the other at Rees; Bouillon, Lockman, and a Battalion of Militia at Duffeldorff; Reding at Guedres; Arbonnier at Udingen; the Royal Artillery at Neufs; the Dragoons of Chapt at Cleves, and in the Neighbourhood; Flamarans at Orfoy; Schomberg at Altkirk, and the Light Troops at Rees, Zanten, and Wesel. If the Regiments were compleat, they would amount to 27,000 Men.
