Countries not yet peopled shall resound with the Names. Nations not yet born shall celebrate the Memory of your Majesty and your Royal Progenitors.

Long may your Majesty enjoy the Dignity and Splendor of a vast and growing Empire; the Sweetness of uninterrupted Peace and Tranquility; and the Affections of a grateful, obedient, numerous, brave, united, and happy People.

*Cologne, December 1.* On the 18th of last Month the Flying Hospital on the Upper Rhine was broke up, as was that here the 27th. Two Thirds of the Persons employed in the Provisions, Forage, &c. have been discharged. Of four thousand Horses, that transported Provisions to the Army, two thousand seven hundred and fifty are dead this Campaign. The Artillery, belonging to the Division commanded by the Prince of Condé, is at Coblenz, and will be transported from thence by Water to Metz; but a Brigade of Horses belonging to it, have been sent to Neus to draw some Cannon that were left there.

The 28th past Boisselin marched hence; and the 30th Condé Cavalry and Dauphin Infantry: They were followed this Day by Limosin, Briquerville, and Part of the Head Quarters, Champagne, Tourraine, d'Ally Royal Grenadiers Cambie, and two Battalions of Militia, remain here yet.

*Brussels, December 2.* Marshal D'Etrees, having been preceded by the Prince of Condé, went through this City on Tuesday last, at Nine of the Clock in the Morning, coming from the Army. About Noon Part of their Baggage arrived here, and moved on the next Day for Paris.

*Liege, December 3.* This Day Boifgelin of four Battalions entered the Fauxbourgs of this City. They had demanded Quarters for six hundred and seventy Men per Battalion, though the whole Regiment did not amount to fourteen hundred effective Men. They are to be in Garrison at Valenciennes.

*Tongres, December 3.* Condé Cavalry, coming from Cologne in their Way to Valenciennes, arrived here this Day in very bad Order, and continue their March To-morrow.

*Hague, December 3.* The Empire appears to be greatly alarmed upon the March of several Corps of Prussians into the Heart of it. General Kleist has taken Possession of Bamberg: Nuremberg and Ratisbon have shut their Gates, and removed the Military Chest belonging to the Army of the Circles, into Bavaria. The Hostages, which were detained at Nuremberg, are sent to Augsburg.

The French Troops evacuated Ostend and Nieuport the 25th inst.

A Conspiracy against the Empress has been discovered at Moscow, in which some Officers of the Guards were concerned. The Plot being discovered, the chief Conspirators were arrested, and tried. The Senate condemned them to different Kinds of Capital Punishments; but the Empress's Clemency converted the Sentence of Death into Banishment.

*Hague, December 7.* We hear from Berlin, that Conventions for a Suspension of Hostilities for the Winter Months, have been concluded as usual, between the Austrian and Prussian Armies, both in Silesia, and the Electorate of Saxony.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Sir John Evelyn, Baronet, Beaumont Hotham, Samuel Mead, William Levinz, Edward Hooper, Claudius Amyand, Henry Pelham, John-Frederick, and Henry Bankes, Esqrs. to be Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, within that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called England.

Last Tuesday being the Anniversary of the Birth of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, the

Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys of Small Arms from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle, to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Justices on the Occasion. In the Evening there was a Play given by their Excellencies, for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

*Dublin Castle, December 4.*

Late on Wednesday Night the Account arrived here of the Ratification of the Preliminary Articles of Peace being exchanged at Versailles on the 22d of last Month, by the Ministers Plenipotentiary of His Majesty, of the most Christian King, and of the Catholick King: Upon which Occasion, on Thursday the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower, and the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in the Barracks.

And this Day the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of Dublin, the King of Arms, and other Officers attending the State, proclaimed the Cessation of Arms, as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between His Majesty, the most Christian King, and the Catholick King, first at the Castle Gate, and afterwards, went in Procession through the City, escorted by a Squadron of Dragoons, and proclaimed the same at the following Places, viz. at the Tolfel, at Corn-market, at the Old Bridge, at Ormond Bridge, and at Essex Bridge, with the usual Solemnities. After which the Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments quartered here; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Ringing of Bells, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy.

Custom House, London, December 8, 1762.

Whereas on Wednesday the 1st Day of September last, about Eight of the Clock at Night, a most violent Outrage was committed on the Person of Joseph Manuel, of Isford in the Parish of Christ Church Tawynham in the County of Southampton, Labourer, by a Gang of supposed Smugglers, consisting of Eight Persons, who, (under Pretence of being a Press Gang) in an outrageous Manner, forced open the Door of the House of William Manuel, Father of the said Joseph Manuel, at Isford aforesaid, violently seized his Son the said Joseph Manuel; said they were King's Men, and dragged him by Force out of the House, carried him across the Heath to the Sea Shore towards Poole, and forced him down to Bourn Mouth to a lonely House there, called the Decoy-pond House, notoriously frequented by Smugglers, where, after he had been some little Time confined, he was put into a Boat, afterwards thrown into the Sea, and then carried on board a Smuggling Cutter called the Ranger Privateer of Guernsey, Thomas Donnals, Commander, and well known amongst the Smugglers by the Name of the Dorcas Cutter, which soon after set under Sail and put to Sea: That, in their Passage to sea, and after their Arrival there, the said Joseph Manuel was treated with great Cruelty, and would probably have been murdered, if some few of the Crew relenting had not interposed: That the said Joseph Manuel was compelled to fire off (with Intent, as it is supposed, to destroy him) an overcharged Blunderbuss, which burst, and sore off his Left Thumb: That having lost life in this Condition at Alderney, he found Means since to escape from thence, and to return Home.

This Outrage having been committed on Account of the said Joseph Manuel's being supposed to have given Information to the Officers of the Revenue; and there being great Reason to believe that it was not (as some of them have declared) any Resentment of their own, that induced the Master and Crew of the Ranger, otherwise called the Dorcas Cutter, to commit this atrocious Outrage, but that they were hired or instigated to do it by some of the principal Smugglers on that Part of the Coasts of Dorsetshire and Hampshire.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, and to suppress the enormous Smuggling now most audaciously carried on upon that Part of these Coasts, do hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the principal Offenders or Ringleaders of this Gang, and more especially the Person who first entered the House of the said William Manuel, and pretended to have the King's Authority—the said Thomas Donnals, who commanded the Vessel or Smuggling Cutter when Joseph Manuel was forced on Board, the Persons who threw him into the Sea, or who forced him to fire off the overcharged Blunderbuss above-mentioned; to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction. And the said Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do also promise

the like Reward of Fifty Pounds, to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any of the Persons by whose Means or Instigation any of the Offenders before-mentioned were hired or induced to commit the said Outrages, to be likewise paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.
