Westminster, December 21.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Lana Tax to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three.

An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty, certain Duties upon Malt, Munn, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three.

An Act to continue and render more effectual two Acts of Parliament, for Repairing and Widening the Road leading from the Black Bull Inn in Dunstable in the County of Bedford, to the Way turning out of the said Road up to Shafford House in the County of Hertford.

An Act to continue and render more effectual two Acts of Parliament for Repairing the Roads from Lemsford Mill through Welwyn and Stevenage, and by Cory's Mill to Hitchin, and from Welwyn through Codicot to Hitchin in the County of Hertford.

And to Five private Bills.

Genoa, November 27. The greatest Part of the Nobility of this State being returned to Town from the Villegiature, on the 24th Instant a small Council was summoned, in which they reduced the Number of Candidates to six, for the Dignity of Doge: The next Day the Grand Council met, and, by a Plurality of Votes, elected his Excellency Ralph Brignole into that High Office. As soon as the Election was over, he was complimented by great Part of the Nobility; and Yesterday as usual received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and Consuls on the same Occasion.

On the 21st Instant in the Morning, four Barks sailed from hence with about thirteen Hundred Men for Bastia in Corsica, in which Number are included five Companies of new raised Men, called Free Companies, who are to serve only three Years.

This Republick's Troops in Corsica have, of late obtained some small Advantages over the Male-Contents, having, since the Surrender to them of the Post called the Coscia, taken That called St. Maria della Chiappella, which is at a small Distance from the Coscia; and being a Harbour for small Vessels, will be a Place of Refuge for the Genoese Small Craft, when chased by any of the Male-Content's Privateers.

Letters from Madrid of the 9th Instant say, that the Spanish Army being in Want of many Necessaries, the Count d'Arranda had begun to distribute them into Winter Quarters on the Confines of Portugal.

Hamburgh, December 14. The King of Prussia arrived at Leipzick the 5th Instant, accompanied by General Seidlitz.

St. James's, December 16, 1762.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that Mr. William Cheyne, an Inhabitant of the Town of Hungerford, in the County of Berks, upwards of Seventy Years of Age, and his Wife, were, on Saturday the 11th Instant, between Seven and Eight o'Clock in the Evening, (as is collected from Circumstances) when their Maid, on only Servant, was at a Neighbour's House, murdered in their own Dwelling House in the Town of Hungerford aforesaid: The said William Cheyne having been found, the next Morning, sitting in an Arm-Chair, in the Parlor, with his Head reclined, and dead, with a large Wound on the back Part of his Head, which seemed to have been made with an Ax, Chawer, or some such Instrument, and his said Wife lying on the Floor, groveling in her Blood, with a large Fracture in her Skull, which was much depressed upon the Brain, a little above the Temple, and who had her Nose almost cut off, and her Face mangled in a most ghastly Manner, of which Wounds she died the next Day, being the 13th, in the Afternoon: That, in the several Rooms of the said House, every Thing was found in Confusion, Bureau's, Drawers, &c. opened, and what was in them scattered about, though it did not appear that any Thing, except Money, (the Quantity of which was not known) and two Watches, one of Gold, the other of Silver, had been taken away; the Latter of which Watches had this remarkable in it, that it showed, on the Dial Plate, the Day of the Month: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said horrid and barbarous Murders, and in the said Robbery, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person, or Persons, who actually committed both, or either of the said Murders) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Crimes, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Custom House, London, December 3, 1762.

Whereas on Wednesday the 1st Day of September last, about Eight of the Clock at Night, a most violent Outrage was committed on the Person of Joseph Manuel, of Isford in the Parish of Christ Church Twynham in the County of Southampton, Labourer, by a Gang of supposed Smugglers, consisting of Eight Persons, who, (under Pretence of being a Press Gang) in an outrageous Manner, forced open the Door of the House of William Manuel, Father of the said Joseph Manuel, as before said, violently seized his Son the said Joseph Manuel; said they were King's Men, and dragged him by Force out of the House, carried him across the Heath to the Sea Shore towards Poole, and forced him down to Bourn Mouth to a lonely House there, called the Decoy-pond House, notoriously frequented by Smugglers, where, after he had been some little Time confined, he was put into a Boat, afterwards thrown into the Sea, and then carried on board a Smuggling Cutter called the Ranger Privateer of Guernsey, Thomas Donnals, Commander, and well known amongst the Smugglers by the Name of the Dorcas Cutter, which soon after got under Sail and put to Sea: That, in their Passage to Alderney, and after their Arrival there, the said Joseph Manuel was treated with great Cruelty, and would probably have been murdered, if some few of the Crew relenting had not interposed: That the said Joseph Manuel was compelled to fire off (with Intent, as it is supposed, to destroy him,) an overcharged Blunderbuss, which burst, and tore off his Left Thumb: That having been left in this Condition at Alderney, he found Means fine to escape from thence, and to return Home.

This Outrage having been committed on Account of the said Joseph Manuel's being supposed to have given Information to the Officers of the Revenue; and there being great Reason to believe that it was not (as some of them have declared) any Reformation of their own, but induced the Master and Crew of the Ranger, otherwise called the Dorcas Cutter, to commit this audacious Outrage, but that they were hired or instigated to do it by some of the principal Smugglers on that Part of the Coasts of Dorsetshire and Hampshire;

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, and to suppress the enormous Smuggling now most audaciously carried on upon that Part of those Coasts, do hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the principal Offenders or Ringleaders of this Gang, and more especially the Person who first entered the House of the said William Manuel, and pretended to have the King's Authority; the said Thomas Donnals, who commanded the Vessel or Smuggling Cutter when Joseph Manuel was forced on Board, the Persons who threw him into the Sea, or who forced him to fire off the overcharged Blunderbuss above-mentioned; to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction. And the said Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do also promise the like Reward of Fifty Pounds, to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any of the Persons by whose Means or Instigation any of the Offenders before-mentioned were hired or induced to commit the said Outrages, to be likewise paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.
