Drawers, &c. etoned, and what was in them seattered about, though it did not appear that any Thing, except Money, (the Quantity of aubich awas not known) and two Watches, one of Gold, the other of Silver, had been taken away; the Latter of subich Watches had This remarkable in it, that it showed, on the Dial Plate, the Day of the Mouth: His Migely, for the letter discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said botted and barbarous Muraers, and in the said Robbory, is, hereby, fleafed to promise His mift gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person, or Person, who actually committed both, or either of the faid Murders) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Crimes, so that he, she, or they, may be of prebended and convised thereof DUNK HALIFAX.
