Stockholm, December 3. The Orders, for the Reduction of the Forces in this Kingdom, are juſt publiſhed through the Provinces, by a Circular Letter from his Swediſh Majesty.

Berlin, December 14. By the laſt Letters from Saxony, Major General Kleiſt was not yet returned from his Expedition into the Empire. The ſame Letters mention, that his Royal Highneſs Prince Henry was expected at Leipzig at this Day, where he intended paſſing a Week with his Pruſſian Majesty. Count Finkentſtein ſets out To-morrow for Leipzig.

Hamburg, December 17. We learn from Dantzick, that the Ruſſian Troops, which ſtill remain in Pruſſia, having now ſold their Magazines, were to evacuate that Kingdom totally before the End of this Month, in order to return to Ruſſia.

Duffeldorff, December 17. We hear there has been a great Tumult at Weſel, but do not yet know the Particulars. It is ſaid to have been appeaſed with great Difficulty; and that moſt of the Ma-

gistrates have been sent to Prison. This Town is to be evacuated before the End of this Month; and the Palatine Troops, that are to enter in Garrison here, are ready to march from Juliers and Duren on the first Notice.

Cologne, December 17. It is probable the Garrison the French have had here ever since April 1757, will soon quit this Town, as the Commandant has delivered the Keys of the City to the Burgher Masters; also the Posts on the Ramparts, and the Artillery they had taken out of our Arsenal.

A Reform has already been made in the Corps commanded by M. de Conflans, quartered in the Duchy of Juliers, of 20 Men per Company; which has made Travelling very dangerous.

Liege, December 18. Four Battalions of French Militia passed this Place the 15th, in their Return to France. Yesterday the Privy-Council received, from the Court of Brussels, requisitorial Letters for the Passage of six Divisions of Austrian Troops coming from the Low Countries. The Number of Men in each Division is not specified; but it is said each Division has fourteen Carts with Baggage. They were to begin their March the 15th; and it is expected they will arrive on our Territories To-Day.

We have in the Fauxbourgs, and in the neighbouring Towns and Villages of this City, four Squadrons of Dauphin Cavalry, and four of Chap's Dragoons. Roial Piedmont is at Huy, but receive their Forage from hence; and as soon as these twelve Squadrons have consumed the Magazines the French have in this State, they are to continue their March to France.

Hague, December 21. We hear from Madrid, that the King of Spain has granted a yearly Pension of Ten Thousand Livres to the Widow of Don Velasco, who so bravely defended the Moro Fort at the Havannah; and has given his Son a Title of Nobility in Castile, which he is to bear by the Name of the Marquis of Fort Moro. His Catholick Majesty has likewise given Directions, that there should be always, for the Future, one Ship in his Royal Navy, of the Name of Velasco.

By the Accounts received here from the Empire, the Prussian Detachments were returning into Saxony with the Contributions which they had raised during their late Expedition.

Beaufort House, December 21.

This Day Baron Wittorf, Envoy Extraordinary from the Landgrave of Hesse, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland.

To which he was introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Admiralty Office, December 24.

Vice Admiral Sir Charles Saunders gives an Account, in his Letter of the 9th of last Month, from Gibraltar, that the Day before arrived at that Port, His Majesty's Ship the Brune, commanded by Capt. Tonyn, with the Oiseau, a French Frigate of 26 Guns, and about 240 Men, which he fell in with and took the 23d of October, about seven Leagues N. W. by W. from Carthage. The Brune had six Men killed, and 14 wounded, in the Engagement; and there were 40 killed and wounded on Board the Oiseau. The Chevalier de Modone, her Captain, lost his right Arm: Three of his Officers are wounded, and all the rest of them killed.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that Mr. William Cheyney, an Inhabitant of the Town of Hungerford, in the County of Berks, upwards of Seventy Years of Age, and his Wife, were, on Saturday the 11th Instant, between Seven and Eight o'Clock in the Evening, (as is collected from Circumstances) when their Maid, an only Servant, was at a Neighbour's House, murdered in their own Dwelling House in the Town of Hungerford aforesaid: The said William Cheyney having been found, the next Morning, sitting

in an Arm-Chair, in the ParLOUR, with his Head reclined, and dead, with a large Wound on the back Part of his Head, which seemed to have been made with an Axe, Cleaver, or some such Instrument, and his said Wife lying on the Floor, groveling in her Blood, with a large Fracture in her Skull, which was much depressed upon the Brain, a little above the Temple, and who had her Nose almost cut off, and her Face mangled in a most ghastly Manner, of which Wounds she died the next Day, being the 13th, in the Afternoon: That, in the several Rooms of the said House, every Thing was found in Confusion, Bureaus, Drawers, &c. opened, and what was in them scattered about, though it did not appear that any Thing, except Money, (the Quantity of which was not known) and two Watches, one of Gold, the other of Silver, had been taken away; the latter of which Watches had this remarkable in it, that it showed, on the Dial Plate, the Day of the Month: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said horrid and barbarous Murders, and in the said robbery, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person, or Persons, who actually committed both, or either of the said Murders) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Crimes, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
