December 14 By the last Letters from vet returned Berlin, December 14 By the last Letters from Saxony, Major General Kleist was not yet returned from his Expedition into the Empire. The fame Letters mention, that his Royal Highness Prince Henry was expected at Leipzig as this Day, where he intended passing a Week with his Prullian Majelly. Count Finkenstein sets out To-morrow for Leipzig.

Hambourg, December 17. We learn from Dantzig, .. that the Russian Troops, which still remain in Prussia, having now fold their Magazines, were to evacuate that Kingdom totally before the End of this Month,

in order to return to Russia.

Duffelderff, December.17. We hear there has been a great Tumuk at Wesel, but do not yet know We hear there has the Particulars. It is faid to have been appealed with great Difficulty; and that most of the Magistrates have been sent to Prison. This Town is s so be evacuated before the End of this Month; and the Palatine Troops, that are to enter in Garrison here, are ready to march from Julien and Duren on the first Notice.

Cologne, December 17. It is probable the Garrison the French have had here ever since April 1757, will foon quit this Town, as the Commandant has delivered the Keys of the City to the Burgher Masters; also the Posts on the Ramparts, and the Artillery they had taken out of our Arfenal.

A Reform has already been made in the Corps commanded by M. de Constans, quartered in the

Liege, December 18. Four Battalions of French Militia passed this Place the 15th, in their Return Yesterday the Privy Council received, to France. from the Court of Brussels, requisitorial Letters for the Passage of six Divisions of Austrian Troops co-ming from the Low Countries. The Number of Men in each Division is not specified; but it is said each Division has four een Carts with Baggage. They were to begin their March the 15th; and it is expected they will arrive on our Territories To-

We have in the Fauxbourgs, and in the neighbouring Towns and Villages of this City, four Squadrons of Dauphin Cavalry, and four of Chap's Dragoons. Roial Piedmont is at Huy, but receive their Forage from hence; and as Son as these twelve Squadrons have confumed the Magazines the French have in this State, they are to continue

their March to France.

We hear from Madrid, Hague, December 21. that the King of Spain has granted a yearly Pension of Ten Thousand Livres to the Widow of Don Velasco, who so bravely defended the Moro Fort at the Havannah; and has given his Son a Title of Nobility in Castile, which he is to bear by the Name of the Marquis of Fort Moro. His Catholick Majesty has likewise given Directions, that there should be always, for the Future, one Ship in his Royal Navy, of the Name of Velasco.

By the Accounts received here from the Empire, the Prussian Detachments were returning into Saxony with the Contributions which they had raifed

during their late Expedition.

Admiralty Offica, December 24.
Vice Admiral Sir Charles Saunders gives an Account, in his Letter of the 9th of last Month, from Gibraltar, that the Day before arrived at that Port, His Majesty's Ship the Brune, commanded by Capt. Tonyn, with the Oiseau, a French Frigate of 26 Guns, and about 240 Men, which he fell in with and took the 23d of October, about seven Leagues N. W. by W. from Carthagena. The Brune had six Men killed, and 14 wounded, in the Engagement; and there were 40 killed and wounded on Board the Oiseau. The Chevalier de Modone, her Captuin, lost his right Arm: Three of his Officers are wounded, and all the rest of them killed.

Whereas is has been humbly reprofensed to the King, shat Mr. William Cheyney, an Inhabitant of the Town of Hungerford, in the County of Berks, upwards of Seventy Years of Age, and his Wife, were, on Saturday the Lith Instant, between Seven and Eight o'Clock in the Evening, (as is collected from Circumstances) when their Maid, an only Servant, was at a Neighbour's Mouse, murdered in their own Dwelling House in the Town of Hungerford aforesaid: The Said William Cheyney having been found, she news Morning, fitting

in an Arm-Chair, in the Parlear, with his Elead reclined, and dead, with a large Wound on the back Part of his Head, which seemed to have been made with an Ast, Cleaver, or some such Instrument, and his said Wife lying on the Floor, groveling in her Blood, with a large Fracture in her Shull, which was much depressed upon the Brain, a little above the Temple, and who had ber Nose almost cut off, and her Face mangled in a most ghostly Manner, of which Wounds she died the next Day, being the 13th, in the Afternoon: That, in the several kooms of the said House, every Thing was found in Consusson, Bureaus, Drawers, &c. opened, and what was in them scattered about, though it did not appear that any Thing, except Money, (the Quantity of which was not known) and two Watches, one of Gold, the other of Silver, had been taken away; the Latter of which Watches had I his remarkable in it, that it shewed, on the Dial Plate, the Day of the Month: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said borrid and barbarous Murders, and in the said Rob. bery, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracisms Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person, or Per-sons, who actually committed both, or either of the said Murders) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the Jaid Crimes, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
