THE following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Burgh of Great Yarmouth in the County of Norfolk, has been presented to His Majesty by the Hon. Sir Edward Walpole, Knt. one of their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Burgh of Great Yarmouth in the County of Norfolk, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with our most sincere Congratulations on the Prospect opened of a firm, equitable, and lasting Peace, grounded on the Preliminary Articles, which your Majesty hath been pleased to communicate to your People.

Your Majesty's truly Parental Regard, on every Occasion shewn, for the Welfare of your Subjects; the Wisdom so conspicuous, in Planning the several almost unparalleled Enterprizes undertaken by your Majesty's Fleets and Armies; and (amidst the greatest Successes that ever attended the British Arms) that Humanity and Tendernefs shown by your Majesty in preventing the farther Effusion of human Blood, must be ever gratefully remembered by your Subjects.

The Terms of Peace, which your Majesty has been pleased to grant to your Enemies, at the Time they secure to your Majesty great and important Conquests, made by the Bravery of your Subjects, must convince your Enemies of the Equity and Moderation so discernable in them.

The Period put to a just and necessary War, began and carried on not for the Purpose of Conquest, but to secure the Honour of your Majesty's Crown, and the Liberties of your Subjects, at a Time when your Majesty found the good Purposes of the War answered, must make the most lasting Impressions of Duty and Gratitude, on the Minds of all your Subjects.

May your Majesty long enjoy the Blessings of Peace; and may your happy Subjects be united in Duty and Affection to your Majesty, and your illustrious Descendants for ever.

Given under our Common Seal at our Guildhall, this twenty-second Day of December, in the Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-two.

Captain Carpenter, of His Majesty's Ship the Coventry, has sent into Kinsale the Dos Amigos, a Spanish Privateer from St. Sebastian, of Eight Carriage Guns, and Fifty Men, which he took the 1st Instant, in Latitude 47. 37. Longitude, 17. 14. West.

Sir Thomas Adams, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Boston, has also sent into Plymouth, the Family Compact, a Spanish Privateer from St. Sebastian, of Ten Carriage Guns, and One hundred and one Men, which he took in the Latitude 48. 00. one hundred and sixty Leagues to the Westward of the Lizard.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the said threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his or her Accomplice, or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
