AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 29th Day of December, 1762,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**Hereas Signior Francis D'Ageno, Minister of the most Serene Republick of Genoa, hath by Memorial to His Majesty at this Board represented, That the Advantages the said Republick have lately gained over the Rebellious Faction in the Kingdom of Corsica, are now become manifest, as well by the happy Successes of their Arms, as by the great Number of Inhabitants who daily return to their Duty towards their lawful Sovereign, and give the Republick the greatest Hopes of being able to re-establish Peace and Tranquillity throughout that Island, and which would have been already accomplished, if the Chiefs of the Rebels had not eluded it, by exciting the Spirit of Revolting amongst the Inhabitants, in Hopes of drawing Succours from Foreign Vessels; and therefore the said Minister humbly requested, that His Majesty would be pleased to give the most expresse Orders to all His Subjects not to have or hold any Correspondence with the said Rebels, nor to furnish them with any Kind of Succours whatsoever, agreeable to what was enjoined upon a like Occasion by Order of His late Majesty in Council, dated the 10th of May 1753: His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into His Royal Consideration, and being desirous of giving all further just and reasonable Satisfaction to His Majesty's said good Friends and Allies the Republick of Genoa, and to maintain inviolably the Peace and Friendship subsisting between His Majesty and them, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly to charge and command all His Majesty's Subjects, of what Condition soever they be, that they forbear to give or furnish Aid, Assistance, Countenance or Succour, by any Ways or Means whatsoever, to any of the Inhabitants of the Island of Corsica, in Rebellion against the said most Serene Republick, upon Pain not only of His Majesty's high Displeasure, but of suffering such Punishment as by Law may be inflicted on such as wilfully violate His Majesty's Treaties, and infringe the Peace and Friendship subsisting between His Majesty and any Foreign Princes or States — And to the End that all His Majesty's Subjects may be informed hereof, it is His Majesty's Commands, that this Order be Printed and Published in the London Gazette.

*Warsaw, December 8.* Count Bruhl's Palace, which is adjoining to the King's, took Fire in the Night; but being luckily discovered by the Soldier

on Guard, it was extinguished without doing any considerable Damage.

*Lisbon, December 12.* Upon the News of the Signature and Ratification of the Preliminary Articles between Great Britain, France, and Spain, including Portugal, a Cessation of Hostilities, between the respective Armies in this Kingdom has been agreed and published.

*Dusseldorff, December 26.* The Regiment of Bovillon, that was in Garrison here, is marched to Wesel, where there has been a Tumult, in which some French lost their Lives. The Magistrates of that Town, and seven other Persons, are put in Prison. What gave Rise to the Tumult is not yet known.

*Cologne, December 26.* Last Night M. D'Aubigné received two Couriers from Wesel; and this Morning two Battalions of Champagne marched towards Dusseldorff, the Garrison of that Town being marched to Wesel, where there has been a Tumult.

*Liege, December 27.* M. D'Andlau, the French Commandant, has packed up his Baggage, and proposes quitting this Town the 3d of January: But we do not yet hear when the twelve Squadrons, quartered in this State, will march to France.

Captain Middleton, of His Majesty's Ship the Adventure, gives an Account, in his Letter of the 15th inst, dated at Sea, of his having the Day before, in the Latitude of 45 Degrees North, and 10 Degrees West Longitude from the Lizard, chased and taken the Artimisa, a French Privateer, belonging to Bayonne, of Eight Carriage Guns and Sixty Four Men.
