And the Lord Clerk Register, or fuch Two of the principal Clerks of the Selfion as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby refpectively required to attend fuch Meeting, and to admi-nister the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after fuch Election made, and duly exa-mined, to certify the Name of the Peer fo elected, and fign and attest the fame in the Prefence of the faid Peers, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we firiely charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-five Days

Hanau, December 28. Yesterday two Hanoverlan Regiments, that have waited Eight Days at Windeck for the Marching out of the French Garrison, took Possefician of this Place. The Princess of Hesse is shortly expected here from Zell; this City being appointed for the Refidence of her Royal Highnefs.

Frankfort, December 28. It is expected the French will evacuate this Town To-day, and that our Troops will take Poffession of the Gates, Posts, &c. Tomorrow. The Magistrates have named Deputies to compliment the French Commandant on his Departure.

Rintelen, December 29. The Landgrave of Heffe

fet out this Morning early on his Return to Caffel. Cologne, December 30. The French have taken Hostages for the Arrears due from the Dutchy of Cleves, the County of la Marck, &c. and have fent them to Strasbourg. The Rhine not being naviga-ble, the Artillery at Wefel is to be transported by Land; and two Battallons of Champagne are to efcort it. We have here about 700 Auftrian Re-cruits. The French Troops will retire from hence,

as it is generally thought, about the 5th of January. Hamburgh, December 31, Prince George of Hol-ftein Gottorp, appointed Stadtholder of the Dutchy of Holftein Kiel, fet out the Day before Yesterday with his Family for that Place.

His Excellency Lieutenant General de Wurmb, who was chosen Commandant of Hamburgh in December 1743, died here the Night before last, in the Eighty Sixth Year of his Age, greatly regretted by the Inhabitants of this City.

Rotterdom, January 4. The Weather continues very fevere; and the Entrance of the Maeze and Goice are fo full of Ice, that feveral Ships, that were coming in, have been obliged to put back to Sea.

Hague, January 4. The last Letters from the Dutchy of Cleves mention, that the Prussian Detachments are very near Wefel, upon the Left of the Rhine, which is frozen over.

St. James's, January 9. This Day Lacky Abdeleader Hadiel, Ambaffador from the Emperor of Morocco, had his first Audience of Her Majefty.
