A PROCLAMATION,
Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure for Continuing Officers, not already removed or discharged, in Great Britain, Ireland, and the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark.

GEORGE R.
WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Our late Royal Predecessor Queen Anne (intituled, An Act for the Security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line) it was enacted (amongst other Things). That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, should become void by Reason of the Demise of Her said late Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that all and every Person and Persons, in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, for the Space of Six Months next after such Death or Demise, unless sooner removed or discharged by the next in Succession, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to remain and descend: And whereas the Space of Six Months from the Demise of Our Royal Grandfather, of Glorious Memory, was found not sufficient for passing and compleating new Grants, Commissions, and Appointments, for all the said Offices, Places, and Employments; We, for preventing the Inconveniencies that might have happened by the same becoming void, have been pleased by Our Royal Proclamations, to prolong from Time to Time the Continuation of Officers in their respective Offices, Places and Employments; and in regard the Times limited by such Proclamations have been found not sufficient for passing and compleating new Grants, Commissions, and Appointments, for all the said Offices, Places, and Employments; We, for preventing the Inconveniencies that might happen by the same becoming void, out of Our Royal Wisdom and Care of this State (referring to Our Judgement hereafter, the Reformation and Redress of any Misbehaviours or Abuses, upon due Knowledge and Examination thereof) are pleased to, and do hereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Order, Signify, Grant, and Declare, That all Persons who, at the Time of the Demise of Our said Royal Grandfather, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Sark, and have not since been removed or discharged from such their Offices, Places, or Employments, shall be, and shall be adjudged and taken to be, continued in, and hold and execute such their respective Offices, Places, and Employments, in the like Manner as, at the Time of the Demise of Our said late Royal Grandfather, they held, enjoyed, and executed the same, for the Space of Four Months from the Date hereof, unless sooner removed and discharged by Us: And in the mean Time, for the Preservation of the Peace, and necessary Proceedings in Matters of Justice, and for the Safety and Welfare of the State, We do hereby strictly Command all the said Persons, of whatsoever Degree or Condition, That they do

not fail, every One severally, according to his Place, Office, and Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties thereunto belonging, as formerly appertained unto them, and every of them, whilst Our said Royal Grandfather was living. And further, We do hereby Will and Command all and singular Our loving Subjects, of what Estate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be aiding and assisting, at the Commandment of the said Officers, in the Performance and Execution of the said Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender Our Displeasure, and will answer the Contrary at their utmost Perils.

Given at Our Court at *Saint James's*, the Twelfth Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and sixty three, in the Third Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

A Like Proclamation was issued for continuing Officers in Scotland for the further Space of Four Months; which Proclamation is to be passed under the Seal appointed by the Treaty of Union to be kept and made Use of, in the Place of the Great Seal of Scotland.

The humble Address of the Lieutenant, Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Clothiers, Freeholders, and Manufacturers of the County of Gloucester.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lieutenant, Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Clothiers, Freeholders, and Manufacturers of the County of Gloucester, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on having restored Peace to your People, which cannot fail of being acceptable to all from a Principle of Humanity; but as Lovers of our Country, we must rejoice that the Terms of it are honourable, and that our Arms having acquired the greatest Glory by the Extent of our Successes, our Counsels are intituled to the highest Applause from the wise and happy Use they have made of them.

We have obtained by this Peace more than we fought for; and in North America much more than we ever claimed: Have procured Advantages for our Fishery, which, rightly used, will entirely frustrate the Attempts of our Rivals in that Article of Commerce: And in the West Indies we have made Acquisitions, which open a new Field, where the Industry of our Planters may exert itself without Prejudice to our old Colonies. In Africa we have acquired exclusively a new Branch of Commerce, and have left nothing to France in the East Indies, which will not be controuled by that superior Power, which, by the Terms of Peace, is stipulated there to remain to us.

Admirable has been our Conduct during the Spanish War, short in its Continuance, glorious by



its Successes, and fortunate in its Conclusion. The Efforts alone of one Campaign have saved an Ally from Destruction, and terminated in our Favour ancient Disputes, which had themselves been the Cause of former Wars.

Peace thus happily concluded, we rejoice in the pleasing Prospect of those domestick Improvements, which, from your Royal Virtues, we have Reason to expect will now take Place; which, though less brilliant than the Successes of War, are not less beneficial to the Publick. Our Manufactures will thereby be improved, and our Commerce extended. But above all, we rejoice in your Majesty's gracious Assurances, that the strictest Economy will be observed for the Future.

Happy in these pleasing Prospects, we will most ardently offer up to Heaven our constant Prayers, that the Prince, to whom we are indebted for so many Blessings, may long continue to reign over us, and employ that Peace, which he has established, in perfecting the great Work of National Reformation, which, while it compleats our Happiness and Prosperity, will fill up the Measure of His Glory.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Essex, assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held at Chelmsford in and for the said County, the Eleventh Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and sixty three, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty's Royal Person, with our sincerest Congratulations on the Preliminary Articles of Peace being signed.

It is with the highest Satisfaction we see the great Object of the War attained, and such considerable Acquisitions made, by which your Majesty's Territories are so greatly extended: It is a farther Satisfaction to us to reflect, that our Enemies have been convinced, during the War, of our Power to repel their Insults; and we have also reasonable Hopes in the Permanency of the Peace your Majesty has restored to us, from the Inability of our Enemies to renew their ambitious Projects.

Give us Leave, Sir, to observe, that although War is essentially prejudicial to a commercial Nation, we are however confident your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects would, with Alacrity and Zeal, have contributed their utmost towards carrying it on, had the Continuation of it being found necessary. But we cannot help expressing, at the same Time, our warmest Sentiments of Gratitude, to your Majesty, for delivering us from the Miseries of War, at the Zenith of the Nation's Glory, and by a Peace effected to consistently with Honour, Safety, and Wisdom.

May we still further, Sir, be allowed to add, that, under your Majesty's most auspicious Reign, we are firmly convinced, we shall ever see the essential Interests of your People the Standard of your Government; and may your Majesty, persuaded of these our Principles, long continue to reign over a free, dutiful, and loyal People.

Moscow, November 29, N. S. The Empress removes to the Palace in the Wood on Thursday next. Count Solms, the new Minister from the King of Prussia, is just arrived here.

Moscow, December 6, N. S. M. Breteuil, and M. Almodover the Spanish Minister, have had their Audiences, and were at Court Yesterday, being the Empress's Name Day, which was celebrated with the greatest Order, Propriety and Magnificence. Count

Mercy, and the Earl of Buckinghamshire, had the Honour of Supping with her Imperial Majesty. The other Foreign Ministers were at another Table. The Company was excessively numerous, and there was every Appearance of universal Satisfaction.

Florence, December 25. In the last Week Mr. Hutchinson, Chaplain to the English Factory at Leghorn, died there.

Copenhagen, December 25. A Royal Ordonnance, dated the 17th Instant, is just published, enforcing former Regulations, and enjoining some new Observances to prevent the Contagion from spreading among the Horned Cattle.

Berlin, December 25. It is said, that General Wylich is ordered to go to Saalfeld, in order to regulate, with a General Officer of the Army of the Empire, a Convention for a Cessation of Hostilities, during the Winter, between the Prussians and the Troops of the Empire; and, at the same Time, to endeavour to settle a Cartel for the Exchange of their respective Prisoners.

Letters from Silesia confirm the News of Colonel Loffow's March, with a small Detachment, into Poland, the Object of which is to escort some Magazines of Provisions, which have been bought up in that Kingdom, for the Use of the Prussian Army.

Hamburg, January 4. His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia is expected as To-morrow at Berlin from Leipsick, where his Royal Highness has been to visit the King his Brother.

Leicester House, January 14.

This Day Lucky Abdacader Haniel, Ambassador from the Emperor of Morocco, had Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And afterwards of their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York, and Princess Augusta.

To all which he was introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Richard Keen, an Accomplice in the said Murder, is now in Huntingdon Goal.
