its Successes, and fortunate in its Conclusion. The Efforts alone of one Campaign have faued an Ally from Destruction, and terminated in our Favour ancient Difputes, which had themfelves been the Caufe of former Wars.

Peace thus happily concluded, we rejoice in the pleafing Profpect of those domestick Improvements, which, from your Royal Virtues, we have Reason to expect will now take Place; which, though lefs brilliant than the Succeffes of War, are not lefs be-Our Manufactures will neficial to the Publick. thereby be improved, and our Commerce extended. But above all, we rejoice in your Majesty's gracious Affurances, that the strictest Economy will be obferved for the Future.

Happy in these pleasing Prospects, we will most ardently offer up to Heaven our conflant Prayers, that the Prince, to whom we are indebted for fo many Bleffings, may long continue to reign over us, and employ that Peace, which he has effaolished, in perfecting the great Work of National Reformation, which, while it compleats our Happiness and Profperity, will fill up the Measure of His Glory.

The following Address of the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutonants, Juffices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentien en, Stergy, and Free-holders of the County of Elaz, has been prefented to His Majefly by Sir William Maynard, Bart. and William Harvey. Efg. their Reprefentatives in Farliament, being introduced by the Lord of H's Majefty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting : Which Adarefs He Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Juffices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Effex. affembled at the General Quarter Seffions of the Peace held at Chelmsford in and for the faid County, the Eleventh Day of January, One thousand feven hundred and fixty three, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majefty's Royal Perlon, with our fincereft Congratulations on the Preliminary Articles of Peace being figned. It is with the highest Satisfaction we fee the great

Object of the War attained, and fuch confiderable Acquisitions made, by which your Majesty's Terri-tories are so greatly extended : It is a farther Satisfaction to us to reflect, that our Enemies have been convinced, during the War, of our Power to repel their Infults; and we have also reasonable Hopes in the Permanency of the Peace your Majefty has reflored to us, from the Inability of our Enemies to renew their ambitious Projects.

Give us Leave, Sir, to observe, that-although War is effentially prejudicial to a commercial Nation, we are however confident your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects would, with Alacrity and Zeal, have contributed their utmost towards carrying it on, had the Continuation of it being found necessary. But we cannot help exprefling, at the fame Time, our warmest Sentiments of Gratitude, to your Majesty, for delivering us from the Miseries of War, at the Zenith of the Nation's Glory, and by a Peace ef-fectuated fo confiftently with Honour, Safety, and Wildom.

May we still further, Sir, be allowed to add, that, under your Majefty's most auspicious Reign, we are firmly convinced, we shall ever see the essential Interefts of your People the Standard of your Government; and may your Majefty, perfuaded of these our Principles, long continue to reign over a free, dutiful, and loyal People.

Mercy, and the Earl of Buckinghamshire, had the Honour of Supping with her Imperial Majefty. The other Foreign Ministers were at another Table. The Company was excessively numerous, and there was every Appearance of universal Satisfaction.

Florence, December 25. In the last Week Mr. Hutchinson, Chaplain to the English Factory at Leghorn, died there.

Copenbagen, December 25. A Royal Ordonnance, dated the 17th Inflant, is just published, inforcing former Regulations, and enjoining fome new Obfervances to prevent the Contagion from fpreading among the Horned Cattle.

Berlin, December 25. It is faid, that General Wylich is ordered to go to Saulfeld, in order to regulate, with a General Officer of the Army of the Empire, a Convention for a Ceffation of Hostilities, during the Winter, between the Pruffians and the Troops of the Empire; and, at the fame Time, to endeavour to lettle a Cartel for the Exchange of their respective Prisoners.

Letters from Silefia confirm the News of Colonel Loffow's March, with a fmall Detachment, into Poland, the Object of which is to efcort fome Magazines of Provisions, which have been bought up in that Kingdom, for the Ule of the Prussian Army
