and no harm shall Come upon you By us or our " folours Be so good as to Leave a letter oppesitt to the Sign of the five Bels in the infide of the Hedge

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That an anonymous threatening Letter has been written, and sent, by the Post, from London, to Mr. James Agutter, Wine Merchant, at Northampton, in the County of Northampton, which appears, by the Post Mark upon it, to have been put in at the General Post Office in Lombard-street, on Saturday the 15th Instant, and was received by the said Mr. Agutter, at North-ampton aforesaid, the next Day; which Letter was superscribed, as hereunder, and contained the Words, Letters and Figures following, viz.

" To " Mr. Agutter in Abinton Street

" Northampton

" Mr. " Agutter We desire that you would on Thursday " next lay 800 f, behind Your Door and whe will commend a Man to Fetch it if You do not as We command You we will Blow out Your Brains and

Burn down Your Hous over You You are a Son of a Bitch Dam Your Blood We will come and murder Your

next Thursday, if You do not do as We command You We will put You to the Jutmost Torture

Son " You Villian of " a Bitch Yo Theif " I will blow out " Your Brains.

" Dam Your Blood "You Dog

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing and Sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said fames Agutter, as abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person principally concerned in Writing and Sending the same) who shall discover his, or her Ascomplice or Accomplices in the faid Fatth, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement, the Said James Aguster does hereby promise a Revivard of Fifty Pounds to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforefaid, (except as above excepted) to be paid by him, upon the Conviction of any one, or more, of the Of-fenders. James Agutter.
