Warshaw, January 8.
We have no News from Courland of any Importance, but Count Kayzerling has sent a circular Letter to each Senator of this Republick, with an Exposition of the Motives of the Empress of Russia, for taking the Part she does in the Affair of Courland, in Favour of the Pretensions of the Duc de Biron.

Count de Borck, Chambellan of Livonia, departs in two Days for Moscow, to make Representations to the Empress against her interfering in the Affairs of Courland, as being a Fief of the Republick.

Cassel, January 13. Her Royal Highness the Landgravine of Hesse passed through this Territory, on the 5th, in her Way to Hanau.

Copenhagen, January 18. Two Ordonnances, dated the 29th and 30th of December, 1762, have been lately published: The Former contains a new Offer of Pardon to all Deserters from the Danish Troops, who shall return, and engage themselves again in any Regiment belonging to this Service, within the Course of one Year. The Latter recalls home the Danish Seamen, who may have entered into Foreign Services, and offers Pardon to all who shall return to their respective Districts by the 1st of March, 1764, excepting those who have withdrawn themselves for Criminal Causes.

Hamburg, January 18. Last Saturday, the 15th Instant, M. von Jahnus, a Major General in the Austrian Service, was chosen Commandant of this City, in the room of Lieutenant General de Warmb, deceased.

Hamburg, January 25. M. Pouchquine, the Russian Envoy in this Residence, received a Courier the 22d Instant from Moscow, who brought him the Order of St. Catherine for the Reigning Dutchess of Mecklenbourg Schwerin; and M. Pouchquine sets out To-morrow for Schwerin, to deliver the said Order to that Princess.

Berlin, January 18. His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia still continues here: He has been indisposed for some Days, but is now better.

Berlin, January 22. The Preparations for the ensuing Campaign are going on, as well here as in Saxony; though all the Letters from Leipzig mention, that it was believed the Conferences at Hubertsburg would end happily.

Baron Goltze, the late Prussian Minister to the Court of Russia, passed through this Place Yesterday, in his Way to Leipzig.

Prince Dolgoruky is said to be actually on the Road to relieve Prince Repnin, the Russian Minister at this Court.

Liege, the Night of the 25th of January. We are greatly alarmed by the Illness of our Prince. Last Night his Highness received the Sacrament, and all the Court were at Prayers in his Chapel the whole Night, where the Holy Sacrament was exposed. The Grand Vicar has ordered a solemn Mass to be said in all the Churches. The Chapter, which were assembled at Six this Morning, have named Four of the Members to be ready to seal up all the Effects in the Palace, in case it should be necessary.

Maastricht, January 26. This Day Mr. Cressener, who is appointed His Britannick Majesty's Minister to the Diet of Ratisbon, set out for that Place.

Hague, January 25. The British Troops began their March on Sunday last the 23d Instant, and the Head of them was to cross the Maese on Saturday the 29th.

The Marquis of Granby, being now in perfect Health, is on his Way to England by Calais.

The French Commandant in Wesel has renewed with the Prussians, for an unlimited Time, a Suspension of Hostilities on the Lower Rhine.

Hague, January 28. By the last Letters from Liege we learn, that the Cardinal of Bavaria was so ill on the 25th, as to have had the last Sacraments administered to him.

The Broker, John Rice, who lately went off from London, has been arrested at Cambray, and imprisoned by Order of the Court of France.

The King has been pleased to present Saint George Moleworth, Master of Arts, to the Vicarage of Northfleet in the County of Kent, and in the peculiar Jurisdiction of Canterbury, void by the Death of the last Incumbent.

Dublin, January 20.

Tuesday last being the Day appointed for Celebrating Her Majesty's Birth Day, the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: At Noon there was a very splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Justices; and an Ode was performed upon this Occasion. In the Evening a Play was given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and every other Demonstration of Joy.
