Lieutenant of the faid County, to the Earl of Halifax, one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been prefented to His Majefty : Which Address His Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioufly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most gracious Sovereign, PErmit 'as, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects. the Lord Lieuteners and O a Subjects, the Lord Lieutenant and Cuftos Rotulorum, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gen-tlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of your County of Westmorland, assembled at the General Sessions of the Peace held at Appleby on the Tenth, and by Adjournment at Kirkby Kendal on the Fourteenth Day of January, 1763, to offer to your Majefty our most humble and fincerest Congratulations on the Return of Peace.

e Inftigated by Humanity, we rejoice at the Period put to the Calamities of War; but, as Lovers of our Country, how much more ardent is our Joy, when we find, that your Majesty's wife Councils have improved your glorious Succeffes to fecure to your Subjects more folid Advantages, arifing from a Peace as honourable to the British Nation, as the Events of War have been prosperous, and from extended Empire inexhaustible in Sources for augmenting Commerce.

When we confider our Enemies, divested of their Possession Possessi Possession Possession Possession Possession Possession Po to the Summit of Glory, ncknowledging our Superiority, and relinquishing, by the Terms of Peace, every Claim that gave Rife to the late War; firipe of their extensive Possession on the Continent of North America, and our Settlements there fo ef-fectually fecured from Encroachments and Digurbances by an incontcitible Boundary, as to be enabled to open to their Mother Country unbounded Re-fources of Wealth; our Fisheries so greatly extended, and those of France restrained, that, by increasing our Commerce, they must add to our Naval Power, our furest Bulwark; our Possessions in the West Indies increased by fo many new and valuable Acquifitions, without prejudicing our former Settlements there; our Territories in the East Indies fo greatly extended, and strongly established, with such Restrictions on the Settlements of our Enemies, as must for ever preferve to us a Superiority ; the Acquifition of the Gum Coast in Africa, and the Establishment of our Trade in the Bay of Honduras, fo very important to the Manufactures and Commerce of this Nation; our Satisfaction arifes to the highest Pitch of Gratitude to your Majefty, for your Wildom and Goodness in fecuring these great and valuable Advantages to your People, fo much beyond what, in former Negociations, have been thought attain-able, while you had additional Difficulties to furmount from an unprovoked War with Spain, and the pernicious and avowed deftructive Union of the House of Bourbon : A War, which is no less the Admiration of the prefent Age, than it must be the Wonder of Posterity, from the vigorous and effectual Profecution of it in those Parts where our Enemies

most fensibly felt the Weight of your Majesty's Arms, the Succeffes of which, in fo little a Time, not only fpeedily concluded it, but enabled your Majefty to procure the Confirmation of every ancient Treaty between the Two Kingdoms, greatly beneficial to the Commercial Interest of your Subjects ; to adjust Disputes of the greatest Consequence, which former Wars and Negociations had left undecided ; and to add to your Dominions a large and valuable Pro-vince, a further Security to our Colonies, at the fame Time that your Majefty faved from Deftruction the Knigdom of an invaded Ally, deferving every Protection and Support, fuffering for his Steadine's and Attachment to your Majefty and your Kingdoms, and nobly fulfaining every Danger, rather than violate the facred Ties of Friendship and Alliance.

We must still further acknowledge how greatly we are indebted to your Majesty's paternal Tendernefs and Regard, for clofing this long and expensive though fuccefsful War, when we confider ourfelves extricated by it from Burthens too great to support, and our Posterity faved from the Diffress and Dangers, which an Increase of an enormous Debt must have brought on our Country, and which the Exultation of Succefs, and the delufive Glare of Vic-tory, might for a While conceal.

After fuch Reflections on your Majesty's paternal Regard and greatWifdom, thus nobly and feafonably difplayed, allow us, most gracious Sovereign, to express our Gratitude for those domestick Improvements, and that necessary Economy, which your Majesty's Goodness, ever anticipating the Wishes of your People, hath been pleased graciously to recommend from the Throne ; an invariable Adherence to which can alone preferve the Independence, or promote the Greatnels of the British Empire; and which are not lefs beneficial than the glorious Acquifitions of a fuccefsful War.

Bleffed with a British Monarch, the great and declared Purpose of whose Heart is to promote the Good of His People, and who, on every Occafion, hath fo attentively promoted it, what pleafing Prof-pects on the happy Retarn of Peace may we not entertain.

It is our earnest Wish and devout Prayer to Heaven, that your Majefty may be long preferved the Hap-pinefs and Glory, the Delight and Protector of your People, to employ that Peace fo happily and glorioufly re-effablished, in perfecting the great Works your Majefty hath condefcended to promote and recommend : The Completion of which must endear your Majesty's Person and Government to all your dutiful and faithful Subjects, and to the lateft Posterity; leaving it a Doubt, in After Ages, whether, under the auspicious Reign of George the Third, the British Empire hath been more extended by the wife Improvement of a fuccefsful and glorious War, than the Stability of the Conflictution fixed and preferved, and the Happinefs of the Subjects promoted, by a virtuous Prince, in the Times of Peace.

Ratifion, January 20.
