Copenhagen, February 1.

HIS Excellency Count Holstein of Lethra-
bourg, First Minister in the Council,
Chief of the Danish Chancery, and Se-
cretary of State for the Kingdoms of
Denmark and Norway, died here on the 29th past,
after a very short Illness, occasioned by an Inflam-
matory Disorder in his Lungs, at the Age of 68.

Saturday the 29th past, having been the Anni-
versary of the Prince Royal's Birth-day, who then
entered into the 15th Year of his Age, the same was
celebrated with the usual Demonstrations of Joy.
Princess Louisa's Birth-day, falling upon Sunday the
30th, the Celebration of it was put off till the next
Day.

Two Days before his Birth-day, the Prince passed,
with great Applause, through his yearly Examina-
tion in Literature and Science. The Examiners were
several Ecclesiastics, and other learned Men, his
Danish Majesty being present, with his Chief Mini-
sters and Officers of State.

Berlin, February 8: All Military Preparations are
slopt. The Regiments that are to garrison the Places
in Prussia, and on the Lower Rhine, will march
forthwith out of Saxony. Those which are to be
quartered in Pomerania, and in the Marches of Bran-
denbourg, cannot move so soon, but must probably
remain till the Rivers are thawed; so that it is
doubted whether Saxony can be totally evacuated
before the End of next Month.

The Queen of Prussia and the rest of the Royal
Family are expected here by the End of this, or
Beginning of the next Week.

His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia re-
turned last Night from Rhinberg.

Willemstadt, February 15. Twenty Transports of
the Second Division, under Convoy of the Hornet
Sloop, arrived here this Day. The Three Regi-
ments of the Blues, Carabineers, and Honeywood,
and the Three Battalions of Guards, will be em-
barked by the 23d.

Hague, February 18. By our last Advices from
the Army of the Circles we hear, that the Disloca-
tion of it was already begun, the Palatine Troops,
under the Command of General Efferen, being al-
ready on their March Home.

Pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the
26th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, this is
to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information
has been sent to this Office, That on Tuesday the
15th Instant, the Ship Nancy, Charles Young,
Master, of the Burthen of 150 Tons, which was
bound from London to Lisbon, laden with Barley,
Wheat, and Bale Goods, being off Beachy Head,
about Three o'Clock in the Morning, in a Storm of
Wind, the Corn shifting, was blown on her Lee
Side, when the Hatches were under Water; and the
Ship being Water logg'd, and in Danger of Found-
ering, the Master was obliged to run her ashore at
Farleight, to the Eastward of Hastings in the County
of Suffex, where, by the Violence of the Sea, she
was broke to Pieces, and the Crew with Difficulty
saved their Lives.

Pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the
26th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Notice
is hereby given to the Concerned, that Information
has been sent to this Office, That a Sloop or Vessel,
called the Richard and Anna, Matthew Langrish late
Master, laden with Portland Stone, Malt, Strong
Beer, Butter, Twine, and Brandy, set sail the 12th
Instant from Weymouth in Dorsetshire, bound for
London, and, on the 16th, in the Night, the
Sea running high, she was drove ashore, and
struck about a Quarter of a Mile to the Westward of
Rottingdean Gap in the County of Suffex, and the
next Morning bulged; when all the Beer and
Brandy, and One Hundred and Forty-one Tubs of
Butter, with Two Packs of Twine, were saved; and
the Beer is locked up in a Barn at Rottingdean, by
the Officers of His Majesty's Customs; and the But-
ter, Brandy, and Twine, is carried to Brighthelm-
stone, under the Care of Mr. Edward Davis, at that
Place: That the Malt was all lost, and the Hull of
the Ship beaten to Pieces, but the Anchors, Cables,
Sails, Boom, Boltsprit and Graft, were saved.

" I am sorry to acquaint you that there are seven
" poor Families in great distres and we the fathers
" have come to a resolution to borry 50 pounds of
" you for Six months and then hope to pay you the
" principal and Intrest if we do but get work wich you
