Yesterday arrived here the Heer Hamesstayn, being deputed by the Duke of Zell, who, it's faid, is to command in perion the Confederate Forces that are at prefent in this Dutchy.

strasburgh, Sept. 27. We are at prefent not altogether at cafe here, to fee the Imperial Army fo far from us, and confequently this City, at leaft the Villages belonging to it, exposed to the French. The Prince of Conde continues indeed in his Camp at Kaftenholtz, but fends out feveral parties daily into these quarters; we hear that he has quartered his Cavalry at large, for their better refreshment in several neighbouring Villages, and that he hath lately received fome confiderable reinforcements. Montecuculi is about Weißenburg, and, as we are informed, has caused 1600 Horse to pass the Rhine at Lauterburg', under the command of the Count of Rabata, with what defign we know not farther than that it's faid, they are to observe the French, who have paffed the Rhine at Brifac, and, as we are told, are marched into Suabia, to raife Contributions.

Francfort, Scpt. 28. The young Duke of Lorrain is gone towards the Saar, where, we are told, a separate Body will be formed of the Lorrain and other Confederate Troops, to give the French a diversion on that side. Upon the approach of the Imperial Army towards the Palatinate, the general belief was, that the fiege of Philipsburgh was intended, but at present it is much doubied, and people will rather believe, that General Montecuculi has his eye towards Lorraine. In the mean time, he fortifies Lauterburg, and St. Remy, two confderable paffes into the Palatinate.

Spire, Sept. 29 Yefferday the Imperial Army was encamped at 1 angenhandel, a fmall Town fcituate between Rhin-Zaberne and Lauterburg, not far from the Rhine; and our advices tell us, That the Imperialists work with great application to raife a Fore at Lauterburg, where the Bridge of Boats arrived from Strasburg, and was laid over the Rhine the 26 inflant. Landaw has received an Imperial Garifon; and we hear, that General Montecusuli has possessed himself of the Castle of St. Rhemie near Philipsburg, by means of which, the French of that Garison will be much hindred in their incursi-Two days fince the Elector Palatine deputed his ons Vice-Chancellor and Secretary to General Montecuculi, to confer with him about the prefent pofture of affairs.

Cologne, Octob. 1. The Lunenburg and O(nabrug Forces continue still in this Dioces, though they have yesterday changed their quarters, and are come withintwo Leagues of this City. Our last Letters from Strafburgh, tell us, That General Montecuculi was with the Imperial Army on the 28 past, near Lauterburg on the Rhine; where his Bridge of Boats arrived two days before from Strasburg. From Treves we hear, That the Confederates are forming, between the Saar and the Moselle, a body of 10000 Men; viz. 3000 Lorrainers, 3000 Munsterians, 2000 Spaniards, and 2000 Imperialists, and that the young Duke of Lorrain was arrived with his Troops.

Bruffels, Ollob. 4. Our Army continues encamped, as we told you in our last, his Highness the Prince of Orange having fill his quarters at Hannut, and the Duke]

de Villa Hermofa at O. p !e Grand ; and there feems the less appearance of the Armies removal from thence, for that his Highness has given orders for the fortifying his The Duke de Luxemburgh remails with the Camp. French Army a Sombreff Abby, and likewife fortifies himfelf there. From Ruremon ! they write, That the 30 paft, 1 200 Lunenburgh Horfe arrived there, and has ving joined the Dutch Regiments commanded by the Count de Stirum, marched the next day by the way of Tongres, towards the Prince of Orange's Army, where, it's believed, they are arrived this day. . Three of the faid Dutch Regiments are marched back to go into Garifon in Grave, Bolduc, and Nimeguen. There is now no more discourse of the besieging of Limburg or Liege by our Forces, the Winter coming on fo fast, that it's thought, they will rather think of Winter quarters. The matter concerning the French quitting the Diocefs of Liege, and the granting it a Neutrality, as was lately proposed by the Deputies of Liege, to the Prince of Orange, and the Duke de Villa Hermofs, has not had the effect that was expected ; and we are apt to believe, that that Proposition was only made to amuse us.

Hagne, Octob. 4. Two days fince was published here a Placaet of the States of Holland, to this effect :

That taking notice of feveral Reports that were spread abroad, by whicked and mulicious persons, as if his Highneys the Prince of Orange went about to affume to himfelf a Soveraignty over these Pro-vinces, and that they (the States) had intention to offer his Highness the sume, meaning thereby to stir up the good Inhabitants of the Land against them (the States) and against bis Highness, to make them unwilling to pay the heavy Taxes with which they are at prefent charged, and to raife Sedition and Tumults in the Land : They (the States) do declare the faid Reports to be falfe, devifed, foundalous, and malicious; and that the Authors, and those that shall be found guilty of them, shall be punished with loss of Life and Goods, as Disturbers and Violators of the publick Feace, &c. From Hamburgh they write, That the Confederate Troops, fince their entring into the Dutchy of Bremen, have taken feveral Polls that were poffessed by the Suedes, and that they at prefent beliege Carelftat. Yellerday morning parted hence the Prince of Gourland, to meet his Bride the Princess of Nassam, who comes with her Uncle Prince Maurits from Cleves. The Ministers of the Allies, and the Deputies of this State, have of late had feveral Conferences together, concerning, as is faid, a General Peace,
