The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Clergy of the County of Glamorgan, at their General Quarter Sessions, assembled and held at Cardiff, the 11th Day of January, 1763.

*Most gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Clergy of your County of Glamorgan; humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty and your Royal Consort on Her late happy Delivery, as well as on the Auspicious Birth

of a Prince Royal, the Heir to the British Realm; nor will your Majesty's Goodness think the Congratulation of Those less sincere, the Loyalty of whose Ancestors to their former Princes, withstood for Centuries the Military and Disciplined Shock of an infinitely superior Force, and at last were received into Allegiance by the gracious Condescension of a Magnanimous Predecessor of your Majesty, on a similar Occasion with the present.
