Warsaw, February 12.

THE King of Poland's Health is now happily re-established, the Humour in his Leg having formed an Abscess, which has been opened by the Physicians; and is now in as fair a Way as can be wished. The Marshal of the Court has ordered Te Deum to be sung on this joyful Occasion.

Ratisbon, February 17. The last Letters from Nuremberg say, that, on Advice that the Neutrality of the Empire was decided at the Diet, the Directory of Bamberg informed the Diet of Franconia of it in an Assembly of the 12th, and proposed the Question; What Measures would be most convenient, in the present Situation of Affairs, for the Good of the Circle. All the Suffrages were of Opinion, to recall the Contingents of Franconia; and to insist, at the same Time, on the Austrian and Saxon Troops Abandoning the Territory of the Circle.

Ratisbon, February 21. The 10th M. Le Baron Plotho received a Courier, who brought him a Rescript from the King of Prussia, dated the 15th Instant, with the News, that the Peace was signed that Morning at Hubertsbourg, between his Prussian Majesty, her Majesty the Empress Queen, and the Elector of Saxony, on the Basis of the Treaties of Breslaw and Dresden; and that consequently, the County of Glatz, and all the Countries belonging to his Prussian Majesty in Westphalia, and on the Lower Rhine, are to be restored to him: Whereupon M. Plotho sent Yesterday his Secretary of Legation, to notify to the Principal Imperial Commissary, and the other Imperial Ministers, as well as to all the other Ministers at the Diet, this happy Event.

Ratisbon, February 24: The Ministers of Saxe Gotha and Hesse have published a Memorial here concerning the Tuition of Saxe Meiningen, of which the following is an Extract.

Anthony Ulric, Duke of Saxe Meiningen, who lately deceased, married for his first Wife, Philippine Cesar, by whom he had several Children; but she being a Tradesman's Daughter, their Children were judged, by virtue of a Result of the Empire in 1747, incapable of succeeding to the Duchy of Meiningen, and the other Estates belonging to the said Duke.

Some Time after, the same Duke married a Second Wife, who was a Princess of Hesse Philipstal; by whom also he had several Children. The said Duke made a Will, by which he instituted Four of his Sons, viz. Two of the First, and Two of the Second Marriage, universal Heirs of the Duchy of Meiningen, as well as of the other Fiefs, Titles, and all Pretensions whatever; but this Will being directly contrary to the said Result of the Empire, the Dukes of Saxe Gotha, Cobourg, and Hildburghausen, as nearest Agnats to the said Duke of Meiningen, resolved to maintain the said Result of the Empire in all its Force and Vigour. They also pretend, as Agnats to the Guardianship of the Children of the Second Bed (there being no lawful Will) and therefore sent Deputies to the City of Meiningen, under a strong Escort of their Troops, who, as soon as they came near the Town, demanded Admittance, but were refused it; on which they summoned the City to surrender, but receiving the same Answer as before, the Commandant, Col. Seltzer, ordered his Troops, the Weather being very bad, to take Possession of an Alehouse, a little out of the Gates of the Town, where they were no sooner entered, than they received a terrible Fire from the Ramparts, which mortally wounded several Soldiers.

Vienna, February 19. Last Night M. Leferer, who has served as Secretary to M. de Collnbach during the Congress of Hubertsbourg, arrived here with the Treaty of Peace, signed the 15th Instant, between this Court and That of Berlin. Her Majesty the Empress Queen made him a Present of a Diamond Ring.

Berlin, February 22. The latest Accounts from Leipzig advise, that the King of Prussia set out for Meissen on the 16th; and that his Majesty will remain in Saxony till the Exchange of the Ratifications, which, it is expected, will be about the End of this Month.

The Princess Royal of Prussia arrived here from Magdeburgh some Days ago, and was received with great Marks of Joy by the Inhabitants of this Capital.

Homburgh, February 25. M. de Hecht, the Prussian Minister in this Residence, received the 19th Instant, an Estafette from Leipzig, with the News, that Peace was signed on the 15th of this Month at Hubertsbourg, between the King his Master, the Queen of Hungary, and the King of Poland as Elector of Saxony. M. de Hecht, having notified this important Event to this Magistracy, was complimented Yesterday by a Deputation in Form, on the Part of this Government.

Hamburgh, February 25. We learn by our last Advices from Berlin, that the King of Prussia set out from Leipzig on the 17th Instant for Breslaw in Silesia.

Hague, March 1. Every Thing is regulating in Saxony, for the Restoring the Electorate to its Sovereign. Both the Austrian and Prussian Troops are evacuating it; and the Saxons are in March to take Possession of the Country.

The March and Embarkation of the British Troops goes on with the utmost Regularity. By the Middle of this Month, Wind and Weather permitting, it is hoped the Whole will be on Board, as the Rear of the Fourth Division will enter Guelderland the 3d Instant.
