The Continuance of those Liberties, and the Protection which this Island has ever enjoyed, under your Majesty and your Royal Ancestors, fince your Family have filled the British Throne, cannot but make us anxious for the perpetuating of the Succession of your Royal Line; and we ardently pray, that your Majesty's extensive Dominions may long slourish under your Majesty's auspicious Government; and that there may never be wanting one of your Royal Progeny to reign over us to the latest Poste-

Moscow, January 31. N.S. The Great Duke's Illness has proved to be the Meazles, and he is

thought to be in a very good Way.

Moscow, February 3, N. S. Her Imperial Majesty honoured the English Ambassador with her Presence at his House on the 31st of last Month. The Company was in Masque, and consusted of

Florence, February 12. This Government having received Notice, that a contagious Distemper has manifested itself in Bosnia, Servia, and other Places near the Confines of Dalmatia, has subjected every thing from Dalmatia, to a Quarantine of Twentyone Days; the same has been done at Venice, Rome, Naples and Genoa.

Copenhagen, February 26. We hear from Norway, that General Gruner, who was Commander in Chief of the Troops of that Kingdom, died at Christiana,

on the 18th Instant, in the 78th Year of his Age.

Berlin, March 1. His Prossian Majesty remains still in Saxony. The Troops have begun to evacuate Saxony; and some of the Regiments, that compose the Garrisons of Berlin and Potsdam, have actually entered those Places; but the total Evacuation cannot be compleated till some Time in April.

Ratisbon, March 1. The Emperor having noti-

fied the Peace to Prince Stolberg, with his Decree thereon, the Army of the Empire will be separated this Week; the Troops of Bavaria and Wurtemberg were to begin their March Yesterday, and the Rest will immediately follow them.

The Affair of Meinungen feems to be now in a

very fair Way of being foon amicably accommodated.

Hague, March 4. The Evacuations of Saxony go on in Pursuance of the Treaty of Hubertsburg; and the King of Prussia has assembled a prodigious Body of Cavalry near Magdebourg, to confume the Re-mainder of his Magazines. The French are preparing to evacuate that Prince's Dominions upon the Lower Rhine as foon as possible; and Detachments from the small Prussian Corps in Westphalia are to take Possession of the Fortresses which shall be restored, till such Time as the Troops arrive, which are to form the Garrison.

The British Troops continue to embark at Willemstadt very successfully; and some of the Transports, which went off with the first Division, are already returned into the Maeze.

Their Serene Highnesses Prince Charles and Prince Ernest of Mecklenbourg, set out To-morrow Morn-

ing for Hanover.

M. Laurenzy, His Britannick Majesty's Electoral Resident with the States General, died here this Evening, in an advanced Age, much regretted.

Hague, March 8. The Prince of Orange entering this Day into his Sixteenth Year, it has been ob-

served as a great Festival here.

The Evacuations in the Prussian Dominions go on gradually. Cleves is already evacuated, and every thing will foon be, in these Parts, in the same Condition as before the War.

The last Subdivision of His Britannick Majesty's Troops crossed the Maese To-day; so that they will embark as fast as the Transports can be ready to take them on board.

The Margrave of Bareith is dead, after an Illness of a few Days. He is succeeded by his Uncle.
