Whitehall, March 15.

ONE of the King's Messengers, dispatched by his Grace the Duke of Bedford, arrived here this Morning, with the Ratifications of their Most Christian and Catholick Majesties, of the Definitive Treaty of Peace, signed the 10th of last Month; and also Those of the Accession of His Most Faithful Majesty to the said Treaty; which Ratifications were exchanged with his Grace, on the 10th Instant, by the Ambassadors and Ministers Plenipotentiary of the Princes above-mentioned, against Those of His Majesty: Upon which Occasion, the Tower and Park Guns were fired.

Vienna, February 23. Since the Arrival of M. Lederer, who brought the Court the Definitive Treaty of Peace signed the 15th Instant at Hubertberg, the Court have dispatched Couriers to inform the Courts, in Alliance with them, of this Event; notifying it, at the same Time, to all the Foreign Ministers.

Nuremberg, February 26. Yesterday the Prince of Stolberg received Orders from his Imperial Majesty to dismiss the Army of the Empire; in Consequence of which, the Bavarian and Wurtemberg Troops will quit the Army the 28th of this Month; and the rest of the Troops of the Circles will be discharged, and march to their respective Homes before the End of the Week.

Ratisbon, March 1. His Imperial Majesty's Decree to the Diet of the Empire, in Answer to the Result of the Empire of the 11th of this Month. Dated the 24th of February, 1763.

Dictated at Ratisbon, the 25th of February 1763, by the Minister of Mentz.

Translation from the German.

BY the Command of his Imperial Majesty Francis, our most gracious Emperor and Master, his most Respectable and Principal Commissary and Plenipotentiary at the Diet of the Empire, Alexander Ferdinand, Prince de la Tour et Taxis, &c. makes known to the Counsellors, Ambassadors, and Ministers of the Electors, Princes, and States of the Holy Roman Empire, that his Majesty has seen, by the most humble Remonstrances which have been made to him, that his Decree, sent to the publick Dictature the 20th of last Month, concerning the Re-establishment of the universal Tranquillity and Safety of the Empire, has been proposed, and that the Counsellors, Ambassadors, and Ministers of the Electors, Princes, and States, having maturely weighed the Contents, agreed on the most humble Advice of the Empire, the 11th of this Month.

The Electors, Princes, and States of the Empire are already informed, that her Majesty the Empress Queen, posponing her essential Interests, has magnanimously acceded to the paternal Sentiments, with which his Imperial Majesty the Emperor is animated, for Re-establishing the General Tranquillity, and for Preserving the Fundamental Laws and System of the Holy Roman Empire.

The more her Imperial Majesty the Empress Queen has been convinced of the Ardour, with which the States of the Empire have desired a speedy Return of the Tranquillity, and publick Security, the more she has exerted her Endeavour in the Negotiations of Peace, lately entered upon with his Majesty the King of Prussia, to accelerate the said Tranquillity, and the Good of her Co-Estates; inseparable the one from the other, and to shew thereby her Thankfulness and Gratitude. The Success has answered this flattering Expectation, and Providence has been pleased to put an End at once to this destructive War, by the Definitive Treaty of Peace concluded and signed the 15th Instant at Hubertberg; the Ratification of which by the Contracting Parties is instantly expected.

As his Majesty was willing, that the several States of the Empire should be informed without Delay of this happy Event, he has annexed hereto the Articles of the said Peace which regard the Empire, leaving the Electors, Princes, and States to take, for the future, the Measures that shall appear most necessary to them.

As to his Majesty, he wishes, as a true Father of the Empire, that the General Peace, re-established in this Manner, may last for ever; and, by virtue of his Imperial Office, he will not fail to give his utmost Attention to every thing, that may contribute to so salutary an Object.

He will not cease to make the Exercise of his most high Office consist in the Administration of a speedy and impartial Justice; in the exact Execution, and solid Maintenance, of the salutary Laws and Decrees of the Empire; and in the inviolable Protection of the Liberties of the States, and of the Dispositions made for the Good of both Religions.

But as his Imperial Majesty, on his Side, is desirous of punctually fulfilling all these Objects, without losing Sight of the true and essential Good of the German Empire, and of all its States in general, his Majesty most graciously persuades himself, that the Electors, Princes, and States, will, on their Part, always take Care to discharge, with the same Exactness, whatever the Duty of States of the Empire, and the publick Good of their native Country, require of them all in general, and of every one in particular; and that they will principally apply themselves to observe religiously and inviolably the *Publick Peace*; the *Peace of Religion*, and the *Peace of Westphalia*.

In the mean Time, his Imperial Majesty, to whom belongs the supreme Direction in the Affairs of War, will lose no Time in making Dispositions, that the Army of the Empire, which was assembled, by virtue of the Resolution of that Body in 1757, may be dismissed, and sent Home, without Delay, in the same good Order, with all that belongs to it, but in a Manner compatible with the Dignity of the Empire, which his Majesty doubts not, but the Electors, Princes, and States will observe in the present Conjunction.

To this End, his Imperial Majesty has already sent Orders to the General in Chief of the Imperial Army and That of the Empire, to discharge, in

good Order, the Succours raised by the Empire, and to send them to their respective Circles, where the Directorial Princes will be able to make such Regulations, on this Occasion, as the Constitution of the Empire requires of them.

The following are the Articles of the Treaty of Hubertsberg, communicated by the above Decree to the Diet.

Translated from the French.

Article II. There shall be on both Sides an Eternal Oblivion, and a General Amnesty of all Hostilities, Losses, Damages, and Wrongs, committed during the late Troubles, by either Party, of what Nature soever; so that there shall be no farther Mention made of them, nor any Compensation demanded, under any Pretence, or upon any Consideration whatsoever. The respective Subjects of each Power shall never be molested upon that Account, but shall fully enjoy this Amnesty, and all its Consequences, notwithstanding the Avocatory Letters, which have been issued and published. All Confiscations shall be entirely taken off; and such Goods as have been confiscated or sequestred, shall be restored to the Proprietors, who were in Possession of them before these last Troubles.

Article IV. All Hostilities shall entirely cease on both Sides, from the Day of the Signature of the present Treaty of Peace. For this End the necessary Orders shall be immediately dispatched to the Armies and Troops of the two High Contracting Parties, wheresoever they may be; and in Case, through Ignorance of what has been stipulated in this Respect, any Hostilities shall have been committed after the Day of the Signature of the present Treaty, they shall not be deemed to affect this Treaty in any Manner; and in this Case the Men and Effects which may have been taken and carried away, shall be faithfully restored.

Article V. Her Apostolick Majesty the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia shall withdraw her Troops from all the Countries and States of Germany, which are not under her Dominion, within the Space of Twenty-one Days after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty; and within the same Term she shall cause to be entirely evacuated, and restored to his Majesty the King of Prussia, the County of Glatz, and, in general, all the States, Countries, Towns, Places, and Fortresses, which his Prussian Majesty possessed before the present War in Silesia, or elsewhere, and which have been occupied by the Troops of her Apostolick Majesty the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, or by those of her Friends and Allies, during the Course of the present War. The Fortresses of Glatz, Wesel, and Gueldres, shall be restored to his Prussian Majesty in the same State, with regard to the Fortifications, in which they were, and with the Artillery that was found therein when they were taken. His Majesty the King of Prussia shall withdraw, within the same Space of Twenty-one Days after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty, his Troops from all the Countries and States of Germany, which are not under his Dominion; and he shall evacuate and restore, on his Side, all the States and Countries, Towns, Places, and Fortresses of his Majesty the King of Poland Elector of Saxony, agreeably to the Treaty of Peace, which has been concluded this same Day between their Majesties the Kings of Prussia and Poland; so that the Restitution and Evacuation of the Provinces, Towns, and Fortresses respectively occupied, shall be made at one and the same Time.

Article VI. The Contributions and Deliveries, of what Nature soever they be, as well as all Demands of Recruits, Pioneers, Waggon, Horses, and in general, the Things furnished upon account of War, shall cease from the Day of the Signature of the present Treaty, and every thing that shall be exacted, taken or received, after this Epoch, shall be restored punctually and without Delay.

Each Party shall renounce all Arrears whatsoever of Contributions and Deliveries. The Bills of Ex-

been given on either Side respecting these Matters, shall be declared void and of none Effect, and shall be restored gratis to those who gave them. The Hostages also, which have been taken or given, with regard to the same, shall be released without Ransom: Every thing above-mentioned shall take Place immediately after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the present Treaty.

Article VII. All Prisoners of War shall be reciprocally and faithfully restored, without Ransom, and without Regard to their Number, or Military Rank, on their paying however previously the Debts, which they shall have contracted during their Captivity. Each Party shall mutually renounce what has been furnished or advanced to them for their Assistance and Maintenance; and the same Proceeding, in all respects, shall be observed with regard to the Sick and Wounded immediately after their Recovery: To this Purpose, each Party shall name Generals or Commissaries, who shall, immediately after the Exchange of the Ratifications, proceed, in the Places that shall be agreed upon, to the Exchange of all the Prisoners of War. Every Thing that is stipulated in this Article, shall equally take Place with respect to the States of the Empire, in consequence of the general Stipulation contained in the XIXth Article. But as his Majesty the King of Prussia, and the States of the Empire, have themselves subsisted and maintained their respective Prisoners of War, and as, upon this Account, some Individuals may have made Advances, the High Contracting Parties do not mean to derogate, by the above Stipulations, from the Pretensions of the said Individuals in this Respect.

Article XIX. The whole Empire is comprised in the stipulations of the IIth, IVth, Vth, VIth, and VIIth Articles. And by Virtue thereof all the Princes and States shall fully enjoy the Effects of the said Stipulations. And whatsoever is therein stipulated and agreed on between her Majesty the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and his Majesty the King of Prussia, shall take Place equally, and reciprocally between their said Majesties, and all the Princes and States of the Empire. The Peace of Westphalia, and all the other Constitutions of the Empire, are likewise confirmed by the present Treaty of Peace.

Berlin, March 5. The Ratifications of the Definitive Treaties with the Empress Queen, and Elector of Saxony, arrived at Hubertsberg the 1st Instant, and were immediately exchanged. This Day the Proclamation of his Prussian Majesty's Peace with the above-mentioned Powers was published with the usual Solemnities, in the different Parts of this City; and To-morrow Te Deum will be sung in the Churches.

Hague, March 11. On the 9th Instant the Prince of Orange took his Seat in the Assembly of the States General, and of the Council of State, after having taken the Oath of Secrecy.

The Town of Wesel was to be evacuated by the French as this Day.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Samuel Mead, Edward Hooper, Claudius Amyand, Henry Pelham, John Frederick, Henry Bankes, Esqrs. Sir William Mufgrave, Bart. Joseph Pennington, and Corbyn Morris, Esqrs. to be Commissioners for Managing, and causing to be levied and collected, all and singular His Majesty's Customs, within that Part of Great Britain called England.
