A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us, the most Christian King, and the King of Spain, to which the King of Portugal hath acceded, hath been concluded at Paris on the 10th Day of February last, and the Ratifications thereof have been exchanged upon the 10th Day of this Instant March; In Conformity whereunto, We have thought fit hereby to Command, that the same be published throughout all Our Dominions: And We do declare to all Our loving Subjects Our Will and Pleasure, that the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatsoever; strictly charging and commanding all Our loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereunto accordingly.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the 21st Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three, in the Third Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

THE Ceremony of Proclaiming the Peace this Day, not being over Time enough to be inserted this Night, is necessarily deferred till next Saturday.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable the Earl of Egremont, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hath laid before this Board, an Extract of a Letter from Sir Horatio Mann, His Majesty's Resident at Florence, dated the 12th of last Month, giving Information of a Contagious Diltemper having manifested itself in Bosnia, Servia, and other Places near the Confines of Dalmatia, and that the Government of Florence had thereupon subjected every Thing coming from Dalmatia to a Quarantine of Twenty-one Days, in like Manner as had been done at Venice, Rome, Naples and Genoa—His Majesty in Council this Day took the same into His Consideration, and although it appeared, that a Quarantine of Forty Days is at this Time subsisting, by the Orders of this Board, upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, yet His Majesty judges it necessary upon this Occasion to cause the said Orders to be enforced: And to that End, His Majesty doth hereby require and command all the Officers appointed for the Service of Quarantine, to use their utmost Care

and Diligence in causing the several Rules and Regulations, established for the due Performance of Quarantine, to be punctually and strictly observed, and carried into Execution—Whereof the said Officers, and all others whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

It is this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Prohibition on the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, which was directed by Order of Council of the 17th of September last to be continued till the 29th Day of April next, be taken off.
