And for so doing, this shall be your Warrant. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Eighteenth Day of March, 1763, in the Third Year of Our Reign.

St. James's, March 22.

HE Officers of Arms, with the Serjeants at Arms and Trumpeters, mounted their Horses in the Stable Yard St. James's, and proceeding thence to the Palace Gate, Clarenceux King of Arms read His Majesty's Proclamation, and Norroy King of Arms proclaimed it aloud. Which being done, the Procession was made to Charing Cross as follows,

A Party of Horse Grenadiers to clear the Way. Beadles of Westminster with Staves, two and two. Constables of Westminster.

High Constable of Westminster with his Staff. The Officers of the High Bailiff of Westminster with White Wands.

> The Deputy High Bailiff of Westminster. Knight Marshal's Men. Knight Marshal.

> > Drums. Drum Major. Trumpets.

Serjeant Trumpeter in his Collar, bearing his Mace Rouge Dragon Pursuivant, Rouge-Croix Pursuivant, and Portcullis Pursuivant, abreast.

A Party of Horse Guards.

At Charing Cross Norroy King of Arms read the Proclamation, and Windsor Herald proclaimed it aloud. In this Method the Procession was made to Temple Bar, where the Officers of the City of Wellminster recired. And, the Gates being shut, Rouge-Dragon, being conducted by two of His Majesty's Trumpets, after founding thrice, knocked at the Gates; and it being demanded who was there, he replied, The Officers of Arms, who demand Entrance to make His Majesty's Proclamation of Peace with France and Spain; and the Gates being opened, he was conducted by the City Marshal to the Lord Mayor, who, with the Aldermen and Sheriffs, attended within the Gates, and having shewed him the King's Warrant, he returned. The Gates were opened, and the Procession entered. At the End of Chancery Lane, Windsor Herald read the Proclamation, and Somerfet Herald proclaimed it aloud. At the End of Wood Street, Somerfet Herald read the Proclamation, and Lancaster Herald proclaimed it aloud. And lastly, at the Royal Exchange, Lancaster Herald read the Proclamation, and Richmond Herald proclaimed it aloud. The Spectators, who were very numerous at each Place, expressing their Satisfaction by loud Acclamations.
