Count of Mansfelt, to give the Emperor an account of the present posture of the Army, which he will leave under the command of the Duke of Bournonville, having first quarted his Troops in several places, as well on this fide, as the other fide of the Rhine, about Philpfburgh, to free the Palatinate this Winter from the incurfions of that Garifon; and in order hereunto, Lauterburg on the Rhine is strongly fortifying, and great Garisons have been already put into the Castle of St. Remie, Rhine Zaberne, &c. We have advice, that the Troops of the Circle of the Upper Saxony, are on their march towards the Main, and that they have already

passed through Smalkandel and Vath.
Cologne, Off. 4. The Troops of Lunenburg and Ofnaburg are still in this Diocess, and have at present their quarters about four Leagues from this City; it is thought when they remove from thence, they will pass into the Countrey of Juliers. Our last Letters from Treves give us an account, That the young Duke of Lorrain was the 30 past with his Troops in the Countrey of the Prince Palatine of Rhinefelden, and that they had their quarters at Kirne; and from other hands we hear, That the Troops of Munfter, and the Imperialifts which were employed in the Siege of Treves, and have had fince their quarters of refreihment in the Eyffett, have passed the Moselle, and are marched to join the Taid Duke, who will then have a Body of 8 or 9000 Men Our Letters from Spire and Francfort give us an account, that the Imperial Army is going into quarters about Philipsburgh, and that General Montecuculi is teturning to Vienna; though some are of opinion, that when the Imperialitis have finished the Fortifications they are making at Lauterburg, and other places, on both fides the Rhine for the blocking up of Philipsburg. that a confiderable body will go and join the young Duke

of Lorrain, to act on the fide of Lorrain. Bruffels, off. 8. Our Army continues still in the same quarters we told you in our last, and as yet we cannot tell when it will remove from thence, though the Cavality begin to find a scarcity of Forage near their Camp, and are forced to march almost three Leagues to ferch it. On Saturday laft the Duke de Villa Hermofa commanded ten Companies of Dragoons, and four Troops of Horse, to march towards the Countrey of Waer, upon an apprehension, that the French intend to make another incursion on that side, to prevent which, those Troops are to remain for the guard of the passage of the Schelde. The Train of Artillery is still at Tillemont, though there is a discourse, as if for its greater fecurity, it would come back to Louvain, there being not any appearance of employing such heavy Cannon this Campagne; for the winter-season comes on so fast, that all thoughts of a siege feems to be laid aside. The fixth instant, Count Stirum having under his command, seven Regiments of Dutch soot, and sive of Lunenburg horse, had his quarters within a League of our Camp, and yesterday the Prince of Orange went to visit those Troops. The fixth instant, likewise the French Army The fixth instant, likewise the French Army decamped from Sombreffe, and encamped again at Gemblours, in a very advantagious ground, being there about a League nearer to our Army than they were before; and yesterday several Squadrons of the Enemies Horse appeared within sight of our Camp, which gave the Spaniards, who were nearest them, a hot alarum, but the French retired again without attempting any

Brages, OH. 9. Our Letters from Gbent of the feventh infrant, give us an account, that the day before 5000 Frinch of the Garison of Audenarde passed the Schelde, not far from Ghent, and fell into the Countrey of Wass, which they continued to burn and ravage, till the following day towards noon, when they returned again, leaving that whole Countrey, in great confusion and consternation.

Oftend, Octob. 9. This day our Greenland thips arrived, four in number, besides their Convoy of 18 Guns. They have in

On the other On the other hand, the Munsterians had taken Orierberg and Rodenburg, places of considerable strength, the latter of which the Bission mended to make his residence, which hitherto has been at Telling bangen. The Sieur Pass, since his return from Spain, where he was Ambassador on the part of this State, hath been reston sed into the Magistracy of Rosterdam, though not without some opposition. Our Letters from Germany bring us little news, and in Alfasia the Campagne seems to be at an end. The Imperial Army being dispersed into quarters, for the blocking up of Philipshorgh, upon the reiterated instances of the Bleetor Palatine. Here is at present much discourse of
