WHEREAS it hath pleased Almighty God, in His great Goodness, to put an End to the late bloody and expensive War, in which We were engaged, against his Most Christian Majesty the French King, and his Catholick Majesty the King of Spain, by the Conclusion of a just and Honourable Peace between Us, and his said Most Christian Majesty the French King, and his Catholick Majesty, upon such a Foundation, as, by the Blessing of God, may prove effectual to procure a firm and lasting Tranquillity to Us and Our Subjects; We therefore, adoring the Divine Goodness, and duly considering, that such Great and Publick Blessings do call for Publick and Solemn Acknowledgments, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Appointing and Commanding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed throughout England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Thursday the Fifth Day of May next; And, for the better and more orderly Solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care for the timely Dispersing of the same throughout their respective Diocesses: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Day of Thanksgiving be Religiously observed by all Our loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of Suffering such Punishment as We can justly inflict upon all such who shall contemn or neglect the same.

Great Britain called Scotland, upon Thursday the Fifth Day of May next: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, on the said Fifth Day of May next, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn or neglect the Performance of so Religious a Duty: Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We charge, that incontinent, this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewarties, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send Doubles thereof to the several Paroch-Kirks within their Bounds, That upon the Lord's-Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 30th Day of March, 1763,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

INformation having been given to His Majesty at this Board on the 14th of February last, of a Contagious Distemper raging amongst the Horned Cattle in Denmark, and some Parts of Germany — His Majesty judged it necessary, for preventing the said Contagion from being brought into these Kingdoms by the Hides of such distempered Cattle, to require and direct, by His Order in Council of that Day's Date, that no Entry should be passed for the Hides of Horned Cattle either Raw or Salted, which were then, or might thereafter be brought from the Places aforementioned, either directly, or by the Way of Holland, into any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, until His Majesty's Pleasure should be further signified.—And whereas His Majesty hath this Day received Information, that the said Distemper hath broke out with great Violence amongst the Horned Cattle in Sweden, in the Province of Schonen, about Malmoe, and at several Villages to the North-Eastward of Helfenborg;—His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the Directions contained in the aforementioned Order of Council, for putting a Stop to the passing of Entries for Hides coming from Denmark and Germany, be extended to all Raw or Salted Hides coming from any of the Ports belonging to the Kingdom of Sweden into the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Westminster, March 31.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties upon Wines imported into this Kingdom, and certain Duties upon all Cyder and Perry; and for raising the Sum of Three Millions, Five Hundred Thousand Pounds, by way of Annuities and Lotteries, to be charged on the said Duties.

An Act for more effectually securing the Payment of the Duties upon Malt, by preventing Frauds in the obtaining of Allowances, and the mixing of fresh Corn or Grain with Corn or Grain making into Malt.

An Act to prevent occasional Freemen from voting at Elections of Members, to serve in Parliament, for Cities and Boroughs.

An Act for the Encouragement of John Harrison, to publish, and make known, his Invention of a Machine, or Watch, for the Discovery of the Longitude at Sea.

An Act to empower the Commissioners or Governors of the Royal Hospital for Seamen at Greenwich, after defraying the necessary Expenses thereof, to provide for such Seamen worn out, and become decrepit, in the Service of their Country, who shall not be provided for within the said Hospital, and to enable them to receive such Pensions as shall be granted them by the said Commissioners, or Governors, in the most easy and convenient Manner, and for preventing Frauds and Abuses attending the same.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, and opening a Communication from the House of Thomas Hughes, Esquire, adjoining to Halkin Mountain, to Farm, and across the Old Post Road in Counsilt-wechan, to a House at Nant y Moch in Bagilt, in the Occupation of Thomas Gill, in the County of Flint.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads, from Lawton, in the County of Chester, to Burslem, and Newcastle under Lyne, in the County of Stafford, and other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from the Turnpike Road between Oswestry and Wrexham, at or near Whitburys's House, through Llangollen, to the most proper and commodious Joining of the Turnpike Road leading from Wrexham to Ruthin, at or near Tavarin Dwywarch, and from Llangollen aforesaid, through Acre Fair Colliery, to the Finger Post, at the Joining of the Road leading from Oswestry to Wrexham, in the County of Denbigh.

An Act to continue the Term, and enlarge the Powers, of several Acts of Parliament, for repairing the Roads from Maidenhead Bridge to Reading, and from the said Bridge to Henley Bridge in the County of Berks.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of two Acts passed in the First and Twelfth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing the Road from the Powder Mills on Hounslow Heath, in the County of Middlesex, to a Place called Basingstone, near the Town of Bagshot, in the Parish of Windlesham in the County of Surrey.

An Act for the better Cleansing and Enlightening the Streets, Lanes, and publick Ways of the City of York, and the Suburbs thereof, and of the Liberty of St. Peter within the said City, and for keeping the same in Repair, and free from Annoyance, and for regulating the Hackney Coachmen, and Chaiemen, Garmen, and Draymen, within the same.

An Act for continuing the Duties, and enlarging the Powers, granted by Two Acts, made in the Fifth and Twenty-fifth Years of His late Majesty's Reign, for enlarging the Pier and Harbour of Scarborough, in the County of York.

An Act for taking down the Parish Church of St.

Andrew, in the City of Canterbury; and for building a new Church in a more convenient Place.

And to Six Private Bills.

Moscow, February 14, N. S. The Baron de Breteuil leaves this Country the Beginning of April. He returns to Paris before he sets out upon his Embassy to Sweden. Count Caunitz leaves Moscow To-morrow upon his Return to Vienna.

Ratisbon, March 3. They write from Bareuth, that the Margrave died there in the Night between the 26th and 27th of last Month; and that Baron de Ellrod set out the next Day for Wansbeck near Hambourg, where the Margrave Frederick Christian, Successor of the late Prince, now resides, to concert with his Highness what is necessary in order to his Taking Possession of the States devolved to him by the Death of the Prince above mentioned.

Warsaw, March 5. The King of Poland has kept his Chamber ever since his Illness.

This being the Name-day of his Polish Majesty, it will be celebrated with all possible Demonstrations of Joy; and a magnificent Fire-work will be played off in the Evening before the Palace.

Vienna, March 9. The Day before Yesterday, Yesterday, and To-day, have been observed as Thanksgiving Days for the Peace; and To-morrow Te Deum will be sung in the Cathedral, under the Discharge of the Artillery of our Ramparts. The Prussian Artillery found in Glatz is transporting little by little from hence, to be delivered up with that Fortress to his Prussian Majesty. The Imperial Regiments have begun their March to the Quarters assigned them.

Vienna, March 12. Their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by the Arch-dukes and Duchesses, assisted at the Te Deum which was sung the 10th of this Month in the Cathedral Church, on the Re-establishment of the Peace. The Prussian Officers, Prisoners of War, who were at Crems, and other Places, are arrived here, and were admitted that Day to congratulate the Empress Queen on the Peace, and to kiss her Majesty's Hand. They were treated with great Distinction, and Civility. The Letters from Warsaw say, the King of Poland continues to be indisposed.

Nuremberg, March 12. The Army of the Empire are actually separated. The Contingents of Passau and Ratisbon, as well as the Regiments of Suabia, marched the 9th upon their Return home. The Contingents of Franconia are also in March.

According to a Conclusum made by the Diet of Franconia, their Troops will continue to receive Pay till the 1st of April next, when Half of them will be discharged, as well as great Part of the Commissaries, Officers of Artillery, &c.

The Count of Solms, who commands the Saxons, has informed the Diet of the Circle of Franconia by Letter, that he has received Orders from his Court to return home with the Troops under his Command, and that he intends to begin his March the 14th at latest, in four Columns.

By Advice from Wansbeck, we hear, the present Margrave of Bareuth is so ill there, that it is uncertain when his Highness will arrive at Bareuth.

Nuremberg, March 15. The Troops of Saxe Meiningen, that were in the Army of the Empire, have in their Way Home been disarmed, and carried Prisoners to Cobourg, by the Troops of the Dukes of Saxe Gotha, Cobourg, and Hildbourghaufen. The said Dukes still insist upon Exercising the joint Guardianship of Meiningen; however it is hoped, that this Affair will soon be terminated in an amicable Manner.

The Duke of Saxe Cobourg has sent Baron Schlammerdorff as his Minister to the Diet of Franconia, to take Care of the Interests of the Saxon Houses in this Affair of Meiningen.

Copenhagen, March 5. On the 3d Instant was performed the annual Ceremony of Opening the High Court of Justice; but the King of Denmark did not assist at it in Person, as usual, having been prevented by some Indisposition. This however was of no long Continuance, and happily proved

of so little Consequence, that his Danish Majesty held a Council Yesterday, and dined in Publick.

Copenhagen, March 8. There is certain Information, that the Sickness among the Cattle is broken out, with great Violence, in Sweden in the Province of Schonon, about Malmoe, and at several Villages to the North-Eastward of Helsenborg.

Copenhagen, March 19. To-morrow the Court goes into Mourning for Three Weeks for the Margrave of Bareuth, the Bishop of Liege, and the Duke of Saxe-Meinungen.

Berlin, March 15. Baron de Knyphausen, late Minister in England, passed through this Place last Sunday, in his Way to Torgau, where he expected to meet the King his Master as Yesterday, who, it is said, sets out from thence this Day for Silesia; and Preparations are making for his Reception here about the Beginning of next Month.

About two Days ago a large Train of Artillery arrived here from Saxony, and was immediately conducted to the Arsenal. Last Monday the Court went into Mourning, for three Months, for the late Margrave of Brandenburg Bareuth.

Berlin, March 19. His Prussian Majesty paid a Visit to the Prince and Princess Royal of Saxony at Moritzbourg, a Hunting Seat of the King of Poland; and the next Day, the 16th, set out for Silesia.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia arrived here the 16th, in the Evening, and was met at some Distance from the Town by several Companies of Burghers on Horseback, and conducted to the Palace with great Demonstrations of Joy.

Hague, March 15. The French have actually evacuated the Prussian Dominions, which are again in the Power of their Sovereign; and the Regular Troops, which are to garrison the Towns, are in full March for the Lower Rhine.

The King of Prussia is in Silesia.

Hague, March 22. The Austrian Troops, which are to be quartered in the Netherlands, are upon their March thither.

Hague, March 25. All the British Troops are actually embarked, and Lieutenant-General Conway, having settled every Thing relative to that Service in this Country, sets out To-morrow Morning for England.

Hague, March 29. The King of Prussia is expected at Potsdam from Silesia in the Beginning of next Month; after which that Prince is said to intend Visiting his Territories on that Side, and from thence to proceed to Pomerania, and Prussia.

PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, That on the 18th Instant, the Sloop *Justitia*, of and for Gottenburgh, from Bourdeaux, of the Burthen of about 100 Tons, laden with Wine and Brand, whereof Andres Awberg was late Master, was forced into Carmarthen Bay in South Wales, where she lost her Topmast, and struck on the Ground; and having before, in bad Weather, lost the Bow-sprit, the Crew were obliged to quit her, and take to the Boat, which was afterwards, by the Roughness of the Sea, over-set, and the Master and Seven of the Men were drowned; but the Ship has been brought into Tenty Peir, by the Officers of the Customs.
