The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Information having been given to His Majesty at this Board on the 14th of February last, of a Contagious Distemper raging amongst the Horned Cattle in Denmark, and some Parts of Germany — His Majesty judged it necessary, for preventing the said Contagion from being brought into these Kingdoms by the Hides of such distempered Cattle, to require and direct, by His Order in Council of that Day's Date, that no Entry should be passed for the Hides of Horned Cattle either Raw or Salted, which were then, or might thereafter be brought from the Places aforementioned, either directly, or by the Way of Holland, into any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, until His Majesty's Pleasure should be further signified. — And whereas His Majesty on this Day received Information, that the said Distemper hath broke out with great Violence amongst the Horned Cattle in Sweden, in the Province of Schonen about Malmoe, and at several Villages to the North-Eastward of Helsingborg; — His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the Directions contained in the aforementioned Order of Council, for putting a Stop to the passing of Entries for Hides coming from Denmark and Germany, be extended to all Raw or Salted Hides coming from any of the Ports belonging to the Kingdom of Sweden into the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland. — And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Vienna, March 5. The Peace being now made, it is reported here, that the Imperial Troops are to be distributed in the following Manner.

In the Low Countries, 9 Regiments of Infantry, 1 of Cuirassiers, and 1 of Dragoons.

In Italy, 10 Regiments of Infantry, 1 of Cuirassiers, and 1 of Hussars.

In Bohemia, 13 Regiments of Infantry, 2 of Dragoons, and 2 of Hussars.

In Moravia, 6 Regiments of Infantry, 1 of Dragoons, and 2 of Hussars.

In Silesia, 2 Regiments of Infantry.

In Austria, 9 Regiments of Infantry, and 2 of Dragoons.

In the Tyrole, 1 Regiment of Infantry.

In Hungary, 5 Regiments of Infantry, 15 of Cuirassiers, 6 of Dragoons, and 1 of Hussars.

Besides 1 Battalion of each Hungarian Regiment.

Baron Kniphausen, who was lately the King of Prussia's Minister at London; is to come hither as we hear in the same Character.

Vienna, March 16. Colonel Gascheim is set out from hence to regulate the March of the Prussian Prisoners, that are in Tyrol, Styria, Carinthia, and Carniole, and which are all to pass through this City in their Way to Troppau; where they will be exchanged against the Austrian Prisoners, who are already in March for that Place.

Two of the Archduchesses, and Prince Albert of Saxony, are ill of the Measles.

A Commissary of War named Froelick, was murdered the 15th of this Month in his own Chamber, and the Villains who did it, carried off every Thing they found of Value. Great Search is making to find them out.

Warsaw, March 19. The King's Departure for Dresden was fixed for the 18th of next Month; but the Establishment of the Tribunal of Wilna in Lithuania has occasioned it to be postponed till the 25th.

Ratisbon, March 21. The Diet being assembled the 18th, came to a Resolution of addressing his Imperial Majesty an Avis of the Empire, containing the Thanks of the three Colleges, for the most gracious Notification, which his Majesty was pleased to make by his last Decree, of the Conclusion of the Peace between the Empress Queen, and his Prussian Majesty. The Directorial Minister of Mentz was desired to present this Avis to his Highness the Principal Commissary in the Name of the Empire, requiring him to forward it to his Imperial Majesty. As the Day after was St. Joseph's, It could not be carried to the Dictature till To-day. The Diet is now adjourned to the 11th of next Month.

Venice, March 16. On the 11th Instant, in the Night, was wrecked upon this Coast, a Man of War of 80 Guns, called the St. Ignatius, belonging to the Republick, as she was endeavouring to make the Port; by which fatal Accident Three Hundred and Sixty Lives were lost.

Hague, April 1. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, and his Brother Prince Charles, have taken Leave, and are to set out from hence To-morrow for Hanau.

The Prince of Orange has been out of Order ever since Monday last, and his Distemper now appears to be the Small Pox, and of the most favourable Sort.

The highest Commendations are given by every one to the Behaviour both of the Officers and private Men, of His Britannick Majesty's Troops in their Passage through this Country, the most exact Discipline having been observed, during their whole March, by the several Corps; insomuch that there has not been a single Complaint of any Irregularity whatsoever, from the Time of their Entrance upon the Territory of the States, to their Embarkation at Willemstadt.

THE Commissioners appointed by His Majesty for managing the Forfeited Estates in Scotland, which, by an Act of the 25th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, were annexed to the Crown unalienably for the Purposes of Civilizing the Highlands of Scotland, have resolved to bestow, out of the Rents of these Estates, the Sum of 6610 l. Sterling, in Bounties for Encouraging discharged Sailors and Marines, to the Number of 1000, who have served aboard His Majesty's Navy in the last War, to settle as Fishers on the Sea Coast of the Highlands of Scotland.

And to bestow the further Sum of 3000 l. for Encouraging disbanded Soldiers, to the Number of 500, who have served His Majesty in the last War, to settle on the annexed Estates, as Artificers, Manufacturers, or Day-Labourers.

The Encouragement to Sailors is as follows: To each Sailor or Marine, who shall settle as a Fisher on any of the Coasts of the annexed Estates, a Bounty of Two Pounds Sterling, with a Boat fit for the Herring and Cod Fishing to each Crew of Eight Men.

That a Portion of Ground, not exceeding Three Acres, shall be allotted to each of them, for raising Corn, Hay, Pot-herbs, &c. to maintain his Family, and to feed one Cow.—These small Farms to be Rent free for the first Three Years, and thereafter to pay a Rent not exceeding Five Shillings Sterling per Acre.

That each unmarried Soldier, to the Number of 200, who settles on these Estates, shall have yearly, for Three Years, a Præmium of Twenty Shillings Sterling; and if any of them shall marry within Three Years, Houses and Possessions shall be provided for them as above.

That till these Houses can be built, the Commissioners will employ in the publick Works now carrying on upon these Estates, disbanded Soldiers to the Number of 500.
