His Grace the Archbilliop of Canterbury ; the Dukes of Queen-fberry and Lords ; Earl Talbot, Lord Steward of the Hoafhold; the Earls of Huntingdon, Suffolk, Peterborough, Cork, Shaftefbury, Anglefey, Ox-ford. Bath, and Guildford; the Lords Charles and Robert Spencer; the Vifcounts Say and Sele. Stormont Folkestone, and Beauchamp ; the Bishops of Durham, Hereford, Worcester, Bangor, Oxford, Caslifle, Exeter, Kildare, and Clonfert ; the Lords Willoughby de Broke, Leigh, Sandys, Brnce, Ar-cher, Mansfield, Lyttelton, and Scarfdale; the Right Honorable Sir Francis Dashwood, Bart. Chancellor of the Exchequer ; the Right Honorable Sir John Phillips, Burt.; the Honorable and Reverend Mr. Bruce, the Fionorable and Reverend Dr. Talbot, the Honorable Mr. Bouverie. Mr. Ward, Mr. Marsham, and Mr. Lyttelton; Sir Walter Bagot, and Sir Richard Newdigare, Barts. Members for the University ; Sir Charles Mordaunt, Sir Charles Kemeys Tynte, Sir Robert Burdett, Sir Thomas Worfley, Sir Thomas Robinfon, Sir Frank Standish, and Sir Richard Glynn, Barts.; Sir John Gibbons, Knight of the Bath; Sir Septimus Robinfon, Ufher of the Black Rod; with feveral Members of Parliament ; a great Number of Doctors in all Faculties ; and Masters of Arts; amounting in the Whole to up-wards of Two Hundred.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.-

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YE, your Majetty's most faithful and loyal Sub-jects, rine Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of your University of Oxford, humbly beg Leave to approval your Royal Prefence with our most fincere and cordial Congratulations on this happy Occasion. Under your Majefty's most auspicious Administration each Year teens with new Bloffings, and each Year calls upon us to prefent unto your Majefty our just Tribute of dutiful Acknowledgments.

Your Majesty, on your Accession to the Throne of these Kingdonis, found the Nation involved in a neceffary, but expensive and destructive, War; and your first Care hath been to ease your Subjects from this Burthen, and reflore to them the Bleffings of Peace. Your Majefty's prudent and vigorous Meafures have compelled the Enemy to accept of reason-able Terms of Accommodation, and happily put an End to a Glorious and Successful War, by a most Advantageous and Honovrable Peace.

We have likewife the further Satisfaction, through your Majesty's wife Counfels and Negociations, to fee this Bleffing become General; and all Chriftendom, which had long groaned under the Calamities of War, enjoying the Benefits of Quiet and Repole.

Such an Event, however extensively beneficial and univerfally interesting, is in a more particular Manner favourable to Nurferies of Religion and Learning : That Religion, whole peculiar Characteristick is Peace and Benevolence; those Arts and Sciences, which chiefly delight in Peace, and always flourish most in Times of publick Tranquillity.

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Permit us, Dread Sir, on this joyful Occasion, to give the ftrongeft Affurances of our inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government : And we promife ourfelves all Happiness and Profperity under your Majefty's mild and impartial Administration, by being in Peace with the neighbouring Kingdoms, and at Unity among ourfelves. That your Majefty may enjoy a long and happy Reign; that the Bleffings of Peace may attend it, and the Arts of Peace adorn it, is the ardent Wifh and earnest Prayer of your ever grateful and loyal University.

Given at our House of Convocation, this Thirtyfirst Day of March, in the Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred and fixty three.

To which Address His Majefty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer.

IT is highly acceptable to Me to receive thefe your warm Congratulations on the Re-establishment of the Public Tranquillity; an Event so interesting to Huma-nity, so peculiarly connected with the Advancement of Religion, and the Improvement of Letters. Your zeal-ous and unwearied Attention to these great and import-ant Objects of your Care and Duty, justly entitle you to My Countenance and constant Protection.

They were all most graciously received ; and had the Honour of killing His Majefty's Hand.

Most gracious Sovereign, **P**ERMIT us, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Nobility, Gentry, Clergy and Freeholders of your County of Stafford, to prefent to your Majesty our most humble and fincere Congratulations on the Return of Peace.

Glorious as our Conquests must appear, which, under God, have been effected by the Wildom of your Majelty's Councels, the Conduct of your Generals, and intrepid Valour of your Forces, unparalleled by these or other Kingdoms in any Period of Time, we must have been destitute of Humanity (that Characteristic of Bravery) had we not felt very fensibly for the Sufferings and Calamitics which for long and extensive a War hath inevitably occasioned.

We rejoice therefore most fincerely with your Majefty, that through your humane and wife Endeavours (unreftrained by fo many increasing Difficulties) a Stop is now put to the Effusion of human Blood ; that you have to fuccessfully profecuted this extended War in the molt vigorous and effectual Manner, and brought your Enemies to fuch Just and Honourable Terms (now improved and perfected) as must ever redound to your Majesty's Glory, and to the Satif-faction and Advantage of your Kingdoms.

The great Acquisitions now secured to us, the firm Foundation laid by your Majefly's Wildom for the Increase of Trade and Commerce to these Kingdoms, together with your gracious Recommendation from the Throne, of fuch Measures as can alone support us in our present Height of Glory, render it an in3 dispensible Duty to offer this Teffimony of our warmest Gratitude; and it is our earnest Wish and Prayer to Almighty God, that your Majefty may
