Berlin, April 9. On the 7th Instant his Prussian Majesty reviewed the Corps of Artillery, which amount to 4x Battalions, that are to be quartered in this Capital, where Barracks are building for them.

Count Finckenstein is promoted to be First Minister and Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in the room of the late Count Podewels; and M. de Hertzberg succeeds Count Finckenstein, as Second Minister in the same Department.

Berlin, April 12. Many of the Prussian General Officers, who were Prisoners in the Austrian Hereditary Countries, are returned to this Capital, having in their Way passed through Vienna, where they were remarkably well received by their Imperial Majesties, and loaded with Civilities during their short Stay at that Court.

His Prussian Majesty is doing every Thing in his Power towards redressing the Grievances of his Subjects, and particularly to reduce the exorbitant Price of Provisions of all Sorts, by which the Poor have suffered greatly for some Time past.
