Nuremberg, April 5. We hear, that Major Wolf- ling, Imperial Commissary, and Lieutenant General Wittich Prussian Commissary at Dresden, have agreed on the following Convention touching the Exchange of the Prisoners of the Empire, and P. 11. 09.

I. The Generals and Officers shall be at Liberty, from this Time forward, to quit the Places of their Detention, and to go wherever they please, except Four Officers that are to be detained till the Exchange is finished, and the Debts the Prisoners have contracted are paid. The Sick and Wounded shall remain where they are, till such Time as they are entirely cured, and shall be lodged gratis.

II. The Exchange shall be made at Erfurth, that the Country of Saxony may suffer as little as possible.

III. The 2900 Prussian Prisoners, which are in Suabia, shall march in two Columns, and the Pri- soners of the Empire in one. The 19th of this Month is the Day fixed for their respective Depart- ure. They shall march three German Miles a Day for three Days incessively, and halt the Fourth. The Horses necessary for transporting their Baggage shall be furnished them gratis.

IV. The Paroles given by Officers, and now an- nulled, shall be reciprocally returned.

V. The respective Hostages shall be set at Liberty; and the Circle of Franconia is to furnish 460 Men to escort every Column of Prussians.

Nuremberg, April 11. Though it was said the Affair of Saxe Meininger was entirely adjusted, yet we hear the Reports, made by the Dukes of Saxony to the Aulick Council, only regard the Retreat of their Troops from the Duchy of Meininger; and that the Negociations, touching the Tutition, still continues.

Copenhagen, April 16. This Place begins already to grow empty. Their Danish Majesties, together with all the Princesses, are settled at Friedensbourg. The Queen Dowager removes to Hirschholm next Tuesday; and the two Princes will go soon to reside at Friderickberg.

His Danish Majesty has appointed the 28th of June for a Day of Publick Thanksgiving, to be ob- served throughout the Kingdoms of Denmark and Norway, for the Restoration of Peace in Europe, and the Preservation of it in these Dominions. And the like Festival is to be kept on the 2d of August in the more distant Provinces, Nordland and Finmark, and the Isles of Feroc and Iceland.
