THE following Address of the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Port of Hythe, has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Port of Hythe in the County of Kent, beg Leave to express our grateful Sense of your Tenderness for your People, in putting an End to the late expensive and bloody War by a Safe and Honourable Peace. Great as the Successes have been, with which the Almighty has blessed the Wisdom of your Counsels, and the Valour of your Forces by Sea and Land, the World will more revere the Friend of Mankind, who, in the Midst of Victory, could put a Stop to the Ravages of War, than the Conqueror of the most powerful Nations. The unvariable Limits, by which you have bounded your American Colonies, will prevent all future Disputes, and add Strength to your Frontier, and Security to your Subjects. May your Majesty long live the Father of an United and Happy People, and transmit your Crown to a Race of Princes, like yourself, till Time shall be no more. Given under the Seal of the said Corporation, in Common Council assembled, the Twenty-ninth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-three.

Genoa, April 16. This Afternoon the new Doge was crowned with the usual Formalities; and Tomorrow he gives a Banquet to the Nobility of both Sexes, and all the Foreigners of Distinction in this City.

Venice, April 20. Alvise Mocenigo, Procurator of St. Mark, was Yesterday elected Doge, and this Morning crowned with the usual Ceremonies. Francisco Pisani is to succeed Mocenigo as Procurator of St. Mark; to which Dignity it is thought he will be elected on Friday next the 22d instant.

Berlin, April 30. The King of Prussia still continues at Potsdam.

Last Thursday the Corpse of his Serene Highness the late Margrave Charles of Brandenburg, (which was brought from Breslaw, where he died in the Month of June last) was interred here in the Burial Place of the Royal Family, with the Honours due to his Rank, as Prince of the Blood, General of Infantry, and Grand Master of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

Copenhagen, April 30. Letters of the 22d Instant, from Stockholm, bring an Account, that the Day before the King had performed the Ceremony of investing Baron Hierne, Vice-Admiral Lagerbielke, Major General Count Spens, and Colonel Rudbeck, with the Yellow Ribband, as Commanders of the Order of the Sword; and that His Majesty had, at

the same Time, bestowed, the Great Cross of the Order of the North Star upon the Senator Count Fornflycht.

By the same Letters we have Advice of the Death of Senator Wrangel, aged 84 Years.

Hambourg, May 3. His Excellency Lieutenant-General de Jahnus, lately in the Austrian Service, and whom this Republick has chosen Commandant of this City, arrived in Town last Saturday the 30th past.
