HIS Day the Court of Lord Mayor (Sir Charles Afgill, Bart. locum tenens) and Aldermen of the City of London waited on His Majefty, and being intro-duced to His Majefty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Egremont, one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, James Eyre, Eiq; Recorder, addrcsed His Majesty as followeth.

The London

OUR Majefty's Faithful and Loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London, defire to be permitted to pay their humble Duty to your Majefly, and to express their Grateful Sense of your Majesty's Gracious and Benevolent Attention to the Welfare of your People, in relieving them from the increasing Burthens of a long and ex-pensive though Glorious and Successful War.

They enter not into a particular Confideration of the National Advantages refulting from the Treaty of Peace which your Majetty has been pleafed to conclude ;- These have been submitted to a Constitutional. Examination; but they beg Leave thus publickly to declare to your Majefty their entire Acquiefcence in a Measure which your Majefty's Councils, and the Great Council of the Nation, have feen Reafon to approve. And this they have thought it their Duty to do at this Time, when they have with Concern observed a Spirit of Faction unhappily arising, and are apprehensive their Silence might be interpreted an Encouragement of Practices, which their Dutiful Attachment to your Majefty's Perfon and Government, leads them to deter and abhor.

They further beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that as Magistrates to whom the Executive Power of the Government of the City of London is intrufted, it shall be their constant Endeavour to maintain and preferve Domestick Tranquility, Order, Good Governinent, and that true and perfect Liberty which has its Foundation in Obedience to the Laws, and of which Licentiousness, though it often assumes the Name, is, in this Country, the only Enemy.

By a Conduct fo conformable to your Royal Example, they prefume to hope they shall intitle them-telves to the Continuance of your Majesty's Protection and Favour.

To which Address His Majefty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

Return you My fincere Thanks for this Address; and for the Satisfaction you express in the Success of My Endeavours to reftore the Public Peace.

I receive with great Pleasure the Affurances you give Me, of your Abborrence and Deteflation of those Factious and Liconticus Practices, which, alone, can endanger Our prefent happy Settlement, after the Conclusion of Peacy with all Our Foreign Enemies.
