Warsaw, April 26.

THE King left this Place the 25th, in an open Chaise, accompanied by Count Bruhl.

Prince Charles leaves Mittaw this Day, and will be accompanied by the Chambellan de Borck, who has been ordered to leave the Court of Russia in 48 Hours.

Vienna, April 27. Yesterday and To day the Regiment of Anhalt Zerbst, Cuirassiers, and That of Darmstadt, Dragoons, passed through this City in their Way to Hungary. A great Reform will be made in the Austrian Cavalry. The Regiments of Cuirassiers and Dragoons will be reduced to 800 Men, and Those of Hussars to 700 each. Every Squadron will only have 1 Captain, 1 Lieutenant, and 2 Sub-Lieutenants.

Vienna, April 30. The Regiment of Saxe Gotha, Dragoons, passed through this City the 28th, in their Way to Italy. The Letters from Constantinople acquaint us with the Death of the Grand Vizir.

Berlin, May 7. Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick left Potsdam on the 4th, and is gone to reside in his Government at Magdeburgh.

Copenhagen, May 7. About 2000 of the Norway Troops which lay in this Garrison, are now sailed homeward, and will be followed by the Rest as soon as the Transports come back. The Regulars are daily expected from Holstein.

Baron Gleichen is arrived from Madrid, and was presented Yesterday to his Danish Majesty at Friedensburg. He is appointed to succeed Count Wedel-Fries as Envoy Extraordinary to the French Court.

The weekly Bills begin now to decrease in the Burials; and the Distemper among the Cattle is not so violent as it was.

Cassel, May 9. The Landgrave will go next Friday to Wavern for six Weeks, to take the Diversion of Hawking; and has declared his Intention of going from thence to the Baths of Schlangenbad, in the Neighbourhood of Coblenz, for a Month.

Hague, May 13. The States of Holland meet To-morrow. The Prince of Orange has deferred taking his Seat in their Assembly till the next Meeting. The States of Guelderland have ordered their Deputies to present to his Serene Highness, in Form, their Resolution of admitting him into their Provincial Assembly, whenever he sees proper.

By the last Letters from Madrid we hear, that the late Governor of the Havannah is confined close Prisoner, with a Company of Grenadiers to guard him.
