A PROCLAMATION.

*For Pardoning and Discharging Soldiers now in
Custody for Desertion.*

GEORGE R.

Whereas divers Soldiers, duly enlisted, or in Pay as Soldiers, in certain Regiments and Military Corps, which have been since disbanded or disembodied, and in other Regiments or Corps now subsisting, have deserted Our Service, and thereby incurred the Penalties respectively inflicted for such Offence, by several Acts of Parliament passed for punishing Mutiny and Desertion: And whereas many of the said Deserters have been apprehended at various Times, and committed for safe Custody to the several Goals or Prisons belonging to the Countees, Towns, or Places, where such Deserters have been found or apprehended, to the End that they might be proceeded against according to Law; the Names of which Deserters have been, from Time to Time, transmitted to our Secretary at War for the Time being, pursuant to the Provisions of such Acts of Parliament made for Punishing Mutiny and Desertion as aforesaid: And whereas We are graciously disposed to extend Our Royal Mercy to the said Offenders, who may be hereafter useful to their Country in following their honest and lawful Occupations, in Case they are enabled thereto, by receiving Our free Pardon; and being discharged out of Custody in Consequence thereof; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy-Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, pardon and remit all and every such Offence and Offences of Desertion, from any, such Regiments or Military Corps, committed by any Person or Persons now in Custody as aforesaid: And We do also release and discharge the said Offenders from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments, and Penalties, commenced or incurred, for, or by reason of any such Offence or Offences: And We do hereby, by and with the Advice of Our said Privy-Council, declare Our farther Pleasure, and do will and require all and every Goaler and Goalers, Keeper and Keepers of any Goal, House of Correction, or Prison, where any such Detenter or Deserters is or are in Custody, to discharge him or them forthwith, without Fee or Reward, upon receiving a Certificate or Certificates under the Hand of Our Secretary at War for the Time being, that the Name or Names of such Detenter or Deserters do appear to him to have been transmitted to the War Office, pursuant to the Provisions of any of the said Acts. And We hereby further Charge and Command every such Goaler or Keeper, within the Space of Seven Days after receiving any such Certificate as aforesaid, to make a Return to Our Secretary at War for the Time being, of what such Goaler

or Keeper shall have done, in Pursuance of such Certificate, and of this Our Royal Proclamation.—Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to discharge any Person or Persons so in Custody for any such Offence of Desertion, from any Crime, Cause, or Matter, for which he or they shall have been lawfully committed, or detained in the Custody of any such Goaler or Keeper, other than such Offence or Offences of Desertion.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the 20th Day of May, 1763, in the Third Year of Our Reign.

G O D Save the K I N G.

Berlin, May 10.

Separate Act signed by the Plenipotentiaries of her Majesty the Empress Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and of his Majesty the King of Prussia, in pursuance of the 20th Article of the Treaty of Peace concluded at Hubertsburg the 15th of February 1763.

Whereas it has been stipulated in the 20th Article of the Treaty of Peace, concluded between her Majesty the Empress Apostolick Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and his Majesty the King of Prussia, bearing Date the 15th of February 1763, that their said Majesties agreed to include their Allies and Friends in that Treaty of Peace, and that they reserve to name them in a separate Act, which should be of the same Force as the said Principal Treaty, and should in like Manner be ratified by the High Contracting Parties, they would not defer carrying this Stipulation into Execution: And for that Purpose, her Imperial Majesty Apostolick Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and his Majesty the King of Prussia declare, that they do by Name and expressly include in the aforesaid Treaty of Peace of the 15th of February 1763, their Allies and Friends, viz. On the Part of her Majesty the Empress Apostolick Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, his Majesty the Most Christian King, his Majesty the King of Sweden, His Majesty the King of Poland Elector of Saxony, and all the Princes and States of the Empire, who are either her Allies, or her Friends;— And on the Part of his Prussian Majesty, the King of Great Britain Elector of Brunswick Lunenburg, the Most Serene Duke of Brunswick Lunenburg, and the Most Serene Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel.

The High Contracting Parties do likewise include in the aforesaid Treaty of Peace of the 15th of February 1763, her Majesty the Empress of all the Russias, in consequence of the Bands of Friendship which subsist between her and the Two High Contracting Parties, and of the Interest which her Majesty has declared that she takes in the Re-establishment of the Tranquillity of Germany.

In Witness whereof, we the Plenipotentiaries of her Majesty the Empress Queen, and of his Majesty the

the King of Prussia, have, by virtue of our Full Powers and Instructions, signed the present Act, which shall have the same Force, as if it was inserted Word for Word in the Treaty of Peace of the 15th of February 1763, and shall be ratified in like Manner by the Two High Contracting Parties. Berlin, May 14. Last Thursday her Royal Highness Princess Amelia, the King of Prussia's Sister, set out for Potsdam, where she will remain for some Days, and from thence proceed to Aix la Chapelle for the Recovery of her Health. Some Days ago Count Butterlin, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress of Russia to the Court of Madrid, arrived here from Moscow.

Extract of a Letter from Bayreuth, dated the 7th of May, 1763. Yesterday, at Seven in the Evening, our new Margrave, arrived here in perfect Health, preceded by the Light Horse and Hussars. His Serene Highness was saluted by the Cannon of the Town, and seemed highly pleased with the Dispositions made for his Reception, the Bourgers, Guards, Grenadiers and Fusiliers, being all under Arms.

Hambourg, May 17. As last Sunday, the 15th, was appointed by this Government for a Day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God, on Account of the General Peace, the same was duly observed in all the Churches in Town, and upon the Territory belonging to this Republick; and in the Afternoon the Cannon from the Ramparts of this City were fired three Times; and at each Time one Hundred Pieces.

The new Commandant of Hambourg, Baron de Jahnus, having taken the Oath of Allegiance before the Senate, was acknowledged in that Character this Day Sevensnight by the Garrison, which was drawn up upon the Parade on that Occasion.

The Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of York, (which was inserted in the Gazette the 14th Instant) was presented to His Majesty by the Honourable Robert Lane, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.
