Rome, Sept. 25.

N Monday laft, the Refident of *Portugat* had an Audience of the Pope, whom he acquainted, by o der of the Prince Regent his Mafler, with his Highnetics having fitted out 11 Men of War, and that they were put to Sea,

with defign to act against the Cosfairs of Argiers. The Duke d' Effress, Extraordinary Ambaffador from France, continues inditpofed, and, by advice of his Phyficians, is gone 10 país iome time at Albana, to change the Air. We are told that the Marquis d: Liche is on his way wither, in quality of Ambaffa ior from Spain.

This week arrived here two or Venice, Sept. 30. three Veffels from Sicily and Naples, by whom we have advice, That the Maquis de Villa Franca, Viceroy of Sicily is using all enueavors to regain Augusta, from whence the erench receive very great advantages, and that the Spaniards promifed themfelve, they should facceed therein; That the Marquis de los Veleg had not yet taken upon him the Government of Naples, but that the Marquis d' Aftorgas was preparing to quit it, not without fome furprize, that his Succeffor came fo fudden and unexpected upon him, even before he knew that he was made choice of. From Candia we understand, That the Baffa there laboured all he could, to bring back the Greeks, and other People, to inhabit that Kingdom, whom the hard utage they received, had before obliged to retire from thence.

Warfaw, Sept. 23. Two days fince, the Treasurer of the Crown, who is at prefent here, received Letters by an extriordinary Courier from Leopol, which, among other things, gave an account, That they were there in a continual expectation of hearing from his Majefly, who was advanced with his Forces against the Turks and Tanars; it is true, the great numbers of the Enemy, fo far exceeding the Troops of the Crown, even joined with those of the Dutchy of Lithuania, are sufficient ro make us almost despair of any fuccels : but when we confider how it hath pleafed Goa hitherto to preferve us, and that to. above fix weeks our King continued in his Camp near Leopol, with not above 6000 Men, in defiance of an Army of near 200 000, we have reason to promise our felves a happy iffue of his Majesties design, which accor ding to the report of all our Letrets, was to make use of the diforder and difcouragement the late ill fuce-ffes had given the Enemy, who, it's faid, were fo difficult ned thereat, that nothing but the express and peremptory orders they received from the Grand Signior, could have obliged them to advance a fecond time towards Leopol. We have been long kept in expectation of the conjunction of the Moscovites with our Forces, and fill we are fed with hopes only.

Vienna, Sept. 29. Here is arrived the Marquis Spinola Duke of St. Pierre, to confummate his Marriage with the daughter of the Marquis de los Balbaies, Ambaffador here from the Crown of Spain. The laft week was fent hence 5000 pieces of Cloth, and a great quantity of Linnen towards the Rbine, for the cloathing the Army commanded by General Montcenenti, which will be confiderably reinforced, and go early into Winterquarters, that they may be in a condition to come the iooner into the Field the next Spring. The Regiment which hath been raifed in the Hereditary Count ies by Count Porta, for the fervice of spain, is yielded to the Emperor, and has orders to march the next month into stiria. The Canon of Metz, and the Secretary Sorman, who were fome time fince taken into Arreft, for having contrived, as was faid, the escape of the Prince of Furstembergh, have obtained their liberty again.

Ratikbon, ept. 30. The States of the Circle of Suaula, have, by their Deputies here, lately prefented a Memorial to the Dyer; in which they promife to contribute, to the utmost of their power, towards the fubfiltence of the Emperors Army, on condition it take nor is Winter-quarters within the faid Circle; and yefterday a Letter was written by the Dyet, to recommend the matter to his Imperial Majetty. The 27 paft, the last hand was put to the refolution of the Dyet concerning the Guaranty demanded by the Elector of Brandenburg, which is to be fent to the Directors and Colonels of the three Circles, appointed by the Empire, for the putting in execution the Imperial Ban against the King of Sueden, as Duke of Bremen.

Lubick, Ottob. 5.) Since the news we had that the Day: s had poffeffed themfelves of *Roltock* and of their intention of making a Magazine there; we have nor heard any thing from that fide, farther, than that the King of Denmark, and the Elector of Brandenburgh, continued their refolution of forcing their paffage into Pomeren. Some have reported, that the Prince of Anbals hath been fene out with a Body of Men towards Steein, as if there was a defign to make fome attempt on that place. There are at prefert five Danifh Regiments before Wilmar, which block it up on the fide of the Land, hough, it's faid, that the Port is fill open. The Danifh lect continues to Cru fe on the Coafts of Pomeren; to hunder all face, reference many from Aucden.

hinder all fuce rs from coming from sueden, Francfiet, Octob. 6. The Imperial A my continues not tai from Landam, having fortified Lauterburgh and other places in the Bifhoprick of Spire. Two Regiments of the Circle of Saxon, have paffed the Mainat Ajchafj. nbu.g, and take their way towards Halbion, from whence, it's faid, they will continue their much to join the Imperial Army, And on the other fide of the Rhine, the Marquis de Grana is bringing a Regiment of Dragoons, and another of Foor, towards Wormes, which gives people a jealousie, that the Imperialists lotend to place a Garifon there. The Troopsot the Duke of Lorfain, are at prefent in the Countrey of the Duke of Deuxponts, where they will have their quarters for fome time. About eight days fince, the Imperial Refident, after having had a Conference, here with the Marquis of Grana, parted hence towards Franconia and Suabia'; ic is supposed his business is, to dispose the States of that Circle, to admit the Imperial Troops to winter among them. Preparation is making here for the reception of the Dutchels Dowager of Lorrain, who intends to come and refide in this City.

stade, Ollob. 6. Our Troops have had a brave rencounter with the Enemy, and above soo Prifoners have been been brought hither, three Colours, and 18 Officers; among whom, are the Lieutenant-Colonel of Colonel Luthens Regiment, and a Mijor Count Lilly is wounded be flightly. Burgh, Ottersberg and Rothenburg, are in the hands of the Enemy, and at prefent they are before Bremers frde. We expect them etc long here.

Lunenburgh, Oftob. 7. Having been fome time without any certain account of what paffed on the Wefer, we receive at last this particular Relation, viz. That on the 26 palt, feven Men of War, fitted in Hokand for the account of the Elector of Brandenburgh, having on board them a good number of Soldiers, came before Carelftat, under the command of Lieutenant-General Boljey; That on the 28, 8 or 900 Men were put on thoar between Carelft it, and the house of the Sieur Rofenaker ; That the 29, Lieutenant General Bolfoy fent to fummon the Governor of Careiftat; who fent word back, That he had no other aniwer but Powder and Bullet : in the mean time the Beandenburghers on the shore had fortified themfelves, and the thips having drawn themfelves into the form of an Half-moon before the place, continued to batter it very furioufly from morning to night, though without any confiderable effect, and towards night, the Brandenburghs retired to Rofenzchers houfe, where 30 Soldiers deferted, and run to Stade : in the interim, the Suedes refolved to make a Sally, which was accordingly executed the next morning with 200 Men, under the command of Capt. Dalkman, and Capt. Frolich, having with them two pieces of Cannon; but the Biandenburghs having had advice of their intention, were provided for them, and the Suedes were repulsed, both the Captains being wounded, eight or nine Men killed, and their two pieces of Cannon taken, Capt. Frolich is faid to be fince dead ; the Brandenburghs likewise lott That Evening, Col. Sidon, and the feven or eight Men. Colonel of the Watch, arrived with a good party of Suediff Horfe and Dragoons from Stade at Depfted, with defign to fall upon the Brandenburghs ; but they having advice of the Enemies approach from a Pealant, part retired to Wedde Warden, and the reft towards their fhips, who not being able to gevon board, by reafon of the bad weather, were tiken by the Suedes, miking together with those fince found in the Villages thereabouts, near 400 Men, the Suedes recovering likewise their two pieces of Cannon. After which, the Snedes having notice that 600 Danes of Col. Hackwys Regiment, were come into the Country of Ferden, they marched against them, and wholly defeated them, taking 400 Prifoners, and four Colours, befi. es those that were killed, none escoping but the Colonel, and one Captain : in the mean time the Munsters have been more fuccelsful, having taken Burg, Ottersberg and Rothenburg.

Cologne, Oftob. 8. The Troops of Lunenburgh and Ofnabrugh have at prefent their quarters between this City and Nuys on the Rhine: and it is reported, that the Duke of Holftein, who commands them, has received orders to pass the Rhine, and to march towards the Wefer, the Duke of Zell refolving to aft with those Forces against the Suedes in the Durchy of Bremen; but this is uncertain, and agrees not with what they write from Francfort, viz. That the Lunenburgh Troops are to have their Winter-quarters in the Durchy of Fmliers.

Bruffels, Ollob. 11. Our Army continues in its former quarters. On Wednelday last, three Regiments of Spanish Foot, eight of Dutch, and a considerable Body of Horfe, were lent out from the Camp towards Tillemont, under the command of the Spanish Maistre de

Camp General, and the Rhingrate, on what delign nor known ; and yesterday morning carly, 30 Squadrons of French Horfe appeared not fir from our Camp : upon which the Prince of Orange advanced about a league and half towards Tillemont, to cover the Forces fent out the day before, which it was thought the Fiench defigned to attack but they retired a ain, without attempting any thing; and it afterwards appeared, that these I roops were the Vanguard of the French Army, which marched that morning, and encamped about Noon at Harlue and Boneffe ; fo that the two Armies are not now above two Leagues diffant from each other, which makes it the more probable that fome Action may pass between them be ore they part : for both Armies lie in an open Champaigne Country, though each is guarded by a River before it. The Prince has fent back his heavy Cannon to Malines, where it will be embarked for Holland : and yelterday feveral pieces of Cannon and Mortars that remained here, were likewife fhipt, to be fent back to Holland. Our Letters from Spain which arrived yesterday, tell us That the Count de Rache is made Maistre de Camp General of the Forces of thefe Provinces jointly with Don Hieronimo de Quignones, the Marquis of Ribburg Captain of the Guard of Archers; and that her Majelty has declared her intention of conferring the Order of the Golden Fleece, upon the Prince of Roebeck, and the Marquis Conflans.

Oftend, Ottob. 13. Since the incurfion made by the French into the Country of Wass on the fide of Ghant, a party of their Forces have appeared in our Neightorhood a League and half from this Town, their defigubeing thought to be, to p is the River between this prace and Bruges and for enter into the Country of Wass on that fide. The advice brought in by the Boos alle 11 inflant, was, That the memy are about 3500 erong and that they continue in a Whod country for Mathemater, which keeps us full in an Alarm bite. The tench inliant, feven Companies of Drigon is, and four Troops of Houfe arrived, and fill continue on their guard between Leffinge and Bruges, with a great number of Boors in Arms, for that we hope they will be able to make a good refiftance, if the Enemy attempts to pafs the River.
