AT the Court at St. James's, the 11th Day of June, 1763,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the further Improvement of His Majesty's Revenue of Customs; and for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures; and for the Prevention of the clandestine Running of Goods into any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, it is, amongst other Things, Enacted, That for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling; and for the better Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all such Ships and Vessels of War belonging to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, who may be employed in preventing the clandestine Running of Goods on the Coasts of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, One Moiety of the Nett Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Vessels and prohibited Goods, which shall be so seized after the First Day of May, 1763, and condemned and sold according to Law, (the Charges whereof being first deducted) shall be vested in the said Officers and Seamen; and His Majesty is thereby empowered to cause the same to be divided amongst the said Officers and Seamen, in such Proportions, and in such Manner, as His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct, by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations, to be made or issued, from Time to Time, for that Purpose; and His Majesty is likewise empowered by the said Act, to make a Distribution of any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that shall be made by such Officers and Seamen respectively; the Money arising by the Sale of which other Part is directed by the said Act to be paid into the Exchequer. His Majesty, taking the same into His Royal Consideration, is hereby pleased, pursuant to the Powers vested in Him by the said Act, and by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, direct, and appoint, That the Moiety of Seizures, granted by the said Act to the Officers and Seamen as aforesaid, be divided in the following Proportions; videlicet,

1st, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Ships and Sloops of War.

To the Captain or Captains of any such Ships or Sloops, who shall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, Three Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Masters, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Lieutenants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Ensigns, and

Quarter Masters of Land Forces, Boatswain, Gunner, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Surgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, Captain's Clerk, Master Sailmaker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Coxswain, Quarter Masters, Quarter Masters Mates, Surgeons Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, and Sergeants of Marines or Land Forces, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on Board any such Ships or Sloops, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

2d, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Cutters, commanded by Lieutenants.

To the Lieutenant commanding such Cutter, who shall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, One Half Part: To the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate and the Midshipmen, on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part; the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, to have Two Third Parts thereof, and the Midshipman to have the Remainder: But if there should happen to be a Pilot Extraordinary on Board at the making of any such Seizure, the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, is, in that Case, to have One Moiety of the said Eighth Part, and the other Moiety is to be equally divided between the Pilot extraordinary and Midshipman. To the Clerk and Steward, Boatswain's Mate, Gunner's Mate, Carpenter's Mate, and Surgeon's Mate, on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part; To the Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and all other Persons, doing Duty and assisting on Board any such Cutter, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

3d, With Regard to Seizures made by Ships of Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.

That in all such Cases, the Moiety which is given to the Officers and Men who shall make such Seizure, be divided into so many equal Parts, or Shares, as there may be Ships or Sloops, and Cutters concerned therein, and that those Shares be distributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships or Sloops, and Cutters, according to the foregoing Proportions:

And His Majesty doth hereby further order, direct, and appoint, That in Case any Seizures shall be made in any of the Colonies Abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, by His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, being Part of the Squadron, or acting under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commodore, with a Captain under him, such Flag Officer

or Commodore, shall have One Fourth Part of the other Moiety of the said Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer: And in Case any Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any such Ship or Vessel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of making such Seizure, the Share of such Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on Board any such Ship or Vessel, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers, on Board of any such Ship or Sloops, at the Time of making such Seizures, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share, which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Majesty's Pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with.

*Vienna, May 14.* Her Imperial Majesty's Birthday was celebrated Yesterday with great Pomp, and the Court, on that Occasion, was very splendid.

To-day the Court goes to Luxembourg to spend several Weeks. Count Finkenstein is said to be designed for his Prussian Majesty's Minister to this Court; and Baron Rud de Collenberg will go as Imperial Minister to that of Berlin.

M. Holzen, Vice-Governor of this City, is preparing to resign his Post, and to retire into the Country for the Remainder of his Life.

*Munich May 17.* Next Thursday the Electress sets out for the Baths of Embs: Her Serene Highness will be accompanied by 140 Persons. It is believed the Elector will meet that Princess on her Return from the Baths, and that they will spend some Time at the Court of Mannheim.

*Hambourg, June 3.* Prince Augustus of Holstein, Bishop of Lubeck, arrived here a few Days ago with the Princess his Consort, from his Residence of Estin, and proposes to make a Stay here of about six Weeks.

According to Advices received Yesterday from Berlin, the King of Prussia intended to set out on the 6th Instant from Potsdam, in order to make a Tour in his Dominions in the Circle of Westphalia.

*Paris, June 3.* The King, accompanied by the Dauphin, went on Tuesday Morning, at Eleven of the Clock, held his Bed of Justice, and caused several Edicts and Declarations to be enrolled. His Majesty was saluted going and returning by the Artillery of the City, the Bastile, the Invalids, Arsenal, &c. It was near Two when he quitted the Parliament-House.

They were at Work in the Square of Lewis XV. in preparing for the Rejoicings intended upon the Publication of the Peace. The Ceremony of Dedication

dedication of the Square and the Equestrian Statue of the King, will be performed the same Day.

*Hague, June 7.* The Birth-day of the King of Great Britain was celebrated here Yesterday in a very splendid and magnificent Manner, by an Entertainment and Ball given by His Majesty's Ambassador Sir Joseph Yorke: At which near Three Hundred Persons of Distinction, Natives, and Foreigners, of both Sexes, were present. The Company continued assembled till Five this Morning.

The Prince of Orange has been invited, by a formal Deputation of the Corps of Nobles of Holland, to take his Seat among them in his Quality of President of that College.

The last Letters from Italy bring an Account, that General Paoli had gained a very considerable Advantage over the Genoese Troops commanded by General Matra, having totally defeated a Body of 1200 Men, of whom upwards of 600 had been made Prisoners; a near Relation of M. Matra was mortally wounded, and the whole Party by this Means dispersed. The Corsicans have likewise made themselves Masters of a Tower on the Sea Coast of Cape Corso, where they seized a Genoese Vessel under French Colours, loaden with Provisions, Ammunition, and two large Brass Cannon. General Paoli was in March, with his whole Force, in Pursuit of M. Matra, and had caused Te Deum to be sung in all the Provinces under his Jurisdiction.

Whereas it frequently happens, that the Widows and Representatives of Sailors belonging to His Majesty's Service who die at Sea or in Foreign Parts, ignorantly apply to the Ecclesiastical Court of the Jurisdiction nearest to the Place where such Widows and Representatives happen to live, in order to obtain Administration or Probats of the Wills of such Seamen.

And whereas no Wages, due to Seamen as aforesaid, can legally or safely be paid, as the Law now stands, on producing any Administrations not granted by, or Wills which have not been proved in, the Prerogative Court of the See of Canterbury, held at Doctors Commons, London: In order therefore to save unnecessary Trouble and Expence to such Widows or Representatives, Notice is hereby given, that they should not apply for any Wages due to the Deceased, until they have taken out Letters of Administration in the said Prerogative Court, and in no other whatever.

And whereas the Widows and next of Kin of Seamen are sometimes deterred from proving their Wills and Administring, by a Notion, that the Fees and Expences attending the same are so large, that it is not worth their While to entitle themselves to receive Wages which amount only to small Sums.

Notice is hereby given, that the Charge at Doctors Commons of taking Administrations or proving the Wills, in common Form, of Seamen dying in the Pay of His Majesty's Navy, by the Widows, Children, Fathers, Mothers, Brothers or Sisters of such Seamen where the Effects of the Deceased are under the several Rates of Five Pounds, Twenty Pounds, Forty Pounds, and Sixty Pounds, by Commissions or otherwise, amount to no more than the respective Sums particularly specified in the Table or Schedule hereunder mentioned, Stamps Office and Proctors Fees all included.

A Schedule or Table of the Charges at Doctors Commons, of taking Administrations, or proving Wills, in common Form, of Seamen dying in the Pay of His Majesty's Navy, by the Widows, Children, Fathers, Mothers, Brothers or Sisters of such Seamen, distinguished according to the Amount of the Deceased's Effects, and as taken without or by Commission, and wherein Stamps, and all Office and Proctors Fees are included.

His late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks

Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Belfon, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May instant; This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of this Instant, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.
