or Commodore, shall have One Fourth Part of the other Moiety of the faid Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer : And in Cale any St. Captain, Interior Commission or Warrant Sea Ofin cers, belonging to any fuch Ship or Vellel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be ab fent at the Time of making fuch Seizure, the Share of fuch Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, fnall be calt into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinaty Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Perfons doing Duty or affifting on Board any -fuch Ship or Veffel, to be equally divided amongft them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers, on Board of any fuch Ship or Sloops, at the Time of making fuch Seizures, thall have more Commiffions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share, which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their refpective fuperior Commiffions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majelty's Treafury, and the Lords Commillioners of the Admiralty, are to caufe His Majefty's Pleafure, hereby fignified, to be duly complied with.
