P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the further Improvement of His Majesty's Revenue of Customs; and for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures; and for the Prevention of the clandestine Running of Goods into any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, it is, amongst other Things, Enacted, That for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, and for the better Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all such Ships and Vessels of War belonging to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, who may be employed in preventing the clandestine Running of Goods on the Coasts of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, One Moiety of the Nett Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Vessels and prohibited Goods, which shall be so seized after the First Day of May, 1763, and condemned and sold according to Law, (the Charges whereof being first deducted) shall be vested in the said Officers and Seamen; and His Majesty is thereby empowered to cause the same to be divided amongst the said Officers and Seamen, in such Proportions, and in such Manner, as His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct, by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations, to be made or issued, from Time to Time, for that Purpose; and His Majesty is likewise empowered by the said Act, to make a Distribution of any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that shall be made by such Officers and Seamen respectively; the Money arising by the Sale of which other Part is directed by the said Act to be paid into the Exchequer. His Majesty, taking the same into His Royal Consideration, is hereby pleased, pursuant to the Powers vested in Him by the said Act, and by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, direct, and appoint, That the Moiety of Seizures, granted by the said Act to the Officers and Seamen as aforesaid, be divided in the following Proportions; videlicet,

1st, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Ships and Sloops of War.

To the Captain or Captains of any such Ships or Sloops, who shall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, Three Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Masters, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Lieutenants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Ensigns, and Quarter Masters of Land Forces, Boatswain, Gunner, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Surgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, Captain's Clerk, Master Sailmaker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Cox-

swain, Quarter Masters, Quarter Masters Mates, Surgeons Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, and Serjeants of Marines or Land Forces, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on Board any such Ships or Sloops, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

2d, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Cutters, commanded by Lieutenants.

To the Lieutenant commanding such Cutter, who shall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, One Half Part: To the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate and the Midshipmen, on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part; the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, to have Two Third Parts thereof, and the Midshipman to have the Remainder: But if there should happen to be a Pilot Extraordinary on Board at the making of any such Seizure, the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, is, in that Case, to have One Moiety of the said Eighth Part, and the other Moiety is to be equally divided between the Pilot extraordinary and Midshipman. To the Clerk and Steward, Boatswain's Mate, Gunner's Mate, Carpenter's Mate, and Surgeon's Mate, on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part; To the Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and all other Persons, doing Duty and assisting on Board any such Cutter, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

3d, With Regard to Seizures made by Ships or Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.

That in all such Cases, the Moiety which is given to the Officers and Men who shall make such Seizure, be divided into so many equal Parts, or Shares, as there may be Ships or Sloops, and Cutters concerned therein, and that those Shares be distributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships or Sloops, and Cutters, according to the foregoing Proportions.

And His Majesty doth hereby further order, direct, and appoint, That in Case any Seizures shall be made in any of the Colonies Abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, by His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, being Part of the Squadron, or acting under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commodore, with a Captain under him, such Flag Officer or Commodore, shall have One Fourth Part of the other Moiety of the said Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer: And in Case any Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any such Ship or Vessel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of making such Seizure, the Share of such Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on Board any such

such Ship or Vessel, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers, on Board of any such Ship or Sloop, at the Time of making such Seizures, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share, which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Majesty's Pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-third of this Instant June, should be further prorogued to Tuesday the Sixth Day of September next.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable James Bridges, Esq; commonly called Marquess of Carnarvon, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Southampton, and of the Town of Southampton and County of the same, he this Day took the Oath appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

This Day the following Address was read and presented to His Majesty by Doctor King, accompanied by a Committee from the Body of Protestant Dissenting Ministers in and about the Cities of London and Westminster; introduced by the Earl of Halifax.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in and about the Cities of London and Westminster.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YOUR Majesty's ever loyal and faithful Subjects the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in and about the Cities of London and Westminster, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the Restoration of Peace to your own Dominions, and to the World in general: An Event truly interesting to all who are influenced by Sentiments of Humanity, and peculiarly pleasing to the Ministers of the Gospel of Peace.

The unparalleled Success and Glory, which crowned your Majesty's Arms, whilst they excited our Gratitude to the Almighty, could not suppress our Concern for the numberless Calamities and Disorders inseparable from War. As these are happily brought to a Period, we can now indulge the delightful Expectation, That the Advancement of Piety and Virtue, of Civil and Religious Liberty, and of those Arts, which improve and embellish human Life, will be the Result of Publick Tranquillity, and the just Praise of your Majesty's Reign.

The large Accessions, made to your Majesty's Empire in America, not only promise an Increase of Commerce, with its Attendants, Wealth and Power, but likewise open a Way for diffusing Freedom and Science, Political Order and Christian Knowledge, through those extensive Regions, which are now sunk in Superstition and Barbarism, and for imparting, even to the most uncultivated of our Species, the Happiness of Britons.

GREAT SIR,

The Protestant Dissenters have been ever strongly attached to those excellent Princes your Royal Progenitors; having always considered the Revolution as the glorious Era of Liberty in these Kingdoms, and the Succession in your august House, as, under God, its firmest Establishment: And the Goodness of your Majesty's Heart, your high Sense of Domestic Virtue, and your avowed Regard to Religion,

concur to heighten our Zeal for the Dignity of your Crown, and the Prosperity of your Government. It shall be our constant Care to approve our Loyalty and Fidelity to your Majesty, by promoting Concord, and, by recommending to those, with whom we are connected, such Principles, as are calculated to render them, at once, good Subjects, and good Men.

We have only to add, our fervent Supplications to the Most High, that your Majesty may reign long, the Father of a free, and the Delight of an happy People; and that the Imperial Crown of these Realms may descend, in your Illustrious Line, to the latest Generations.

May your Majesty's future Reign be as famous for the Cultivation of the Arts of Peace, as the first Years of it have been signalized by warlike Achievements; and may Loyalty and Respect to your Majesty's Royal Person and Dignity, be the just Tribute of a grateful People, for the many inestimable Blessings which we enjoy under your mild and auspicious Government.

Moscow, May 16, N. S. The Empress having directed the Chancellor to acquaint the Foreign Ministers, that they were at Liberty to set out, as soon as they thought proper, for Petersburg, some have already left Moscow, and all the Rest are upon their Departure.

The Empress will not come to Petersburg sooner than

than the Beginning of June, but will only be at Moscow for two or three Days at a Time.

The French Ambassador leaves this Country in a Day or two. He returns to Paris to settle his private Affairs, and afterwards goes Ambassador to Sweden.

Vienna, May 21. Prince Wenceslaw of Lichenstein sets out this Week for Florence, to prepare a Residence for the Arch Duke Leopold; who, it is said, is to be Governor of Tuscany.

General Haddick has obtained the Government of Warasdin and Carlsbad, having under him General Kleefeld.

Within these few Days 9600 Men of the Austrian Troops, that have been Prisoners in the Prussian Countries, are arrived in the Parts adjacent to this City. The Remainder of the released Soldiers are in March by Poland; and will have their ancient Posts assigned them in their respective Regiments.

Ratisbon, May 25. Baron Plotho, having obtained Leave from his Court to absent himself from the Diet for Five Months, set out Yesterday for Carlsbad, from whence he goes to Berlin.

This Day M. Simolin, the Russian Minister, sets out for Spa.

Berlin, June 4. The King of Prussia set out from Potsdam the 2d Instant, to visit his Westphalian Dominions, and is expected back here by the 20th. He is accompanied on his Journey by his Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia, Lieutenant General Wylich, and Major General Borck.

Count Butterlin, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress of Russia to the Court of Spain, and his Lady, left this Place two Days ago in their Way to Paris.

Copenhagen, June 4. The last Letters from Stockholm are very full of Complaints of the great Scarcity of all Provisions, and of the uncommon Coldness of the Weather, it having continued to freeze there the last Week in May.

Hague, June 10. Accounts have been received here of the Death of the Elector of Mentz in an advanced Age. He is greatly regretted.

The King of Prussia is arrived at Wesel.

Hague, June 14. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick arrived here in perfect Health on Saturday last, to make a Visit to his Uncle Prince Lewis, the Weather not having permitted him to make use of the Baths of Aix la Chapelle. He sets out on his Return thither To-morrow Morning.

The Election of Mentz is fixed for the next Month. Two of the Candidates are Mess. de Breidenbach and Elst, both of the Chapter, and the former Chancellor of the Diocese.

Whitehall, June 18.

The King has been pleased to appoint William Henry, Earl of Rochford, to be His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Catholic King.

Leicester House, June 14.

This Day M. D'Eon, Minister from France, had a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And afterwards of their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York, and Princess Augusta.

To all which he was introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.
