The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the further Improvement of His Majesty's Revenue of Customs; and for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures; and for the Prevention of the clandestine Running of Goods into any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, it is, amongst other Things, Enacted, That for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, and for the better Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all such Ships and Vessels of War belonging to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, who may be employed in preventing the clandestine Running of Goods on the Coasts of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, One Moiety of the Nett Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Vessels and prohibited Goods, which shall be so seized after the First Day of May, 1763, and condemned and sold according to Law, (the Charges whereof being first deducted) shall be vested in the said Officers and Seamen; and His Majesty is thereby empowered to cause the same to be divided amongst the said Officers and Seamen, in such Proportions, and in such Manner, as His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct, by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations, to be made or issued, from Time to Time, for that Purpose; and His Majesty is likewise empowered by the said Act, to make a Distribution of any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that shall be made by such Officers and Seamen respectively; the Money arising by the Sale of which other Part is directed by the said Act to be paid into the Exchequer. His Majesty, taking the same into His Royal Consideration, is hereby pleased, pursuant to the Powers vested in Him by the said Act, and by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, direct, and appoint, That the Moiety of Seizures, granted by the said Act to the Officers and Seamen as aforesaid, be divided in the following Proportions; videlicet,

1st, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Ships and Sloops of War.

To the Captain or Captains of any such Ships or

Sloops, who shall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, Three Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Masters, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Lieutenants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Ensigns, and Quarter Masters of Land Forces, Boatswain, Gunner, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Surgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, Captain's Clerk, Master Sailmaker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Coxswain, Quarter Masters, Quarter Masters Mates, Sergeons Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, and Serjeants of Marines or Land Forces, on Board any such Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on Board any such Ships or Sloops, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

2d, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Cutters, commanded by Lieutenants.

To the Lieutenant commanding such Cutter, who shall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, One Half Part: To the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate and the Midshipmen, on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part; the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, to have Two Third Parts thereof, and the Midshipman to have the Remainder: But if there should happen to be a Pilot Extraordinary on Board at the making of any such Seizure, the Second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, is, in that Case, to have One Moiety of the said Eighth Part, and the other Moiety is to be equally divided between the Pilot extraordinary and Midshipman. To the Clerk and Steward, Boatswain's Mate, Gunner's Mate, Carpenter's Mate, and Surgeon's Mate, on Board any such Cutter, One Eighth Part; To the Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and all other Persons, doing Duty and assisting on Board any such Cutter, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

3d,

3d, With Regard to Seizures made by Ships or Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.

That in all such Cases, the Moiety which is given to the Officers and Men who shall make such Seizure, be divided into so many equal Parts, or Shares, as there may be Ships or Sloops, and Cutters concerned therein, and that those Shares be distributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships or Sloops, and Cutters, according to the foregoing Proportions.

And His Majesty doth hereby further order, direct, and appoint, That in Case any Seizures shall be made in any of the Colonies Abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, by His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, being Part of the Squadron, or acting under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commodore, with a Captain under him, such Flag Officer or Commodore, shall have One Fourth Part of the other Moiety of the said Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer: And in Case any Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any such Ship or Vessel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of making such Seizure, the Share of such Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swalber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on Board any such Ship or Vessel, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers, on Board of any such Ship or Sloop, at the Time of making such Seizures, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share, which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Majesty's Pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with.

Venice, June 3.

ON the 29th and 30th past, the Earl of Northampton, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to this Republick, made his Publick Entry here, with the following Ceremonies:

About Five o'Clock in the Afternoon, of the 29th past, his Excellency went in Private to the Island of San Spirito, where he was met by the English Noblemen and Gentlemen, the Foreigners of Distinction, the Consuls and British Merchants, and received by the Superior and Fathers of the Convent on that Island, and conducted to Apartments furnished by the Republick for the Occasion. In about half an Hour came a Secretary of the College to notify the Arrival of Signior Ruzzini, Cavalier della Stola d'Oro, with 60 Senators, whom the Republick had appointed to attend the Ambassador in this Function. His Excellency sent Word back by the same Secretary, that he was ready to receive the Cavalier. The Cavalier and Senators, on their Arrival at the Island, went directly to the Church of the Convent, where, after staying some Time, they proceeded to the Cloyster, where the Cavalier was met by his Excellency's Secretary, attended by two Gentlemen of the Chamber, and complimented by him on the Part of the Ambassador. By this Time his Excellency was come down into the Cloyster, and advanced some Steps to meet the Cavalier, as did the Cavalier to meet his Excellency. After reciprocal Compliments, his Excellency took the Right Hand of the Cavalier, as did the English Noblemen and Gentlemen, &c. of the Senators, and proceeded to their Boats. His Excellency went in the Cavalier's Gondola, preserving the Post of Honour, and each Senator gave the same to the Gentlemen. His Excellency's State-Boats, and the Boats of the several Ambassadors residing in Venice, joined in the Procession. On the Arrival at the Ambassador's Palace, the Boat in which his Excellency and the Cavalier were, gave Place to the other Gondolas for the Senators and Gentlemen to land, and afterwards they landed themselves. His Excellency then taking the Hand of the Cavalier, and the Gentlemen of the Senators, they proceeded up Stairs to the Audience Room, at the Entrance of which his Excellency and the Gentlemen gave the Hand to the Cavalier and Senators. After all Sorts
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of Refreshments had been served, they took their Leave for that Night, conducted down Stairs by his Excellency and the Gentlemen, giving them the Right Hand.

About Nine o'Clock the next Morning, the Cavalier and Senators being arrived at the nearest Church to the Ambassador's Palace, gave Notice of their Arrival, as the Day before. The Cavalier was received at the Entrance of the Palace by his Excellency's Secretary, and conducted by him half Way up the Stairs, where he was met and complimented by his Excellency; they then proceeded to the Audience Room, observing the same Ceremonies as the Day before. After staying some Time, in which they were treated with Refreshments, the Cavalier and Senators giving the Right Hand to his Excellency and the Gentlemen, proceeded in their Boats to the College. Upon entering of which the Doge and Signoria rose from their Seats; and after the usual Ceremonies his Excellency sat down covered on the Doge's Right Hand. His Excellency's Secretary making a Bow to the Doge and Signoria, presented the Ambassador's Credentials, which his Excellency gave to the Doge, and the Doge to a Secretary of the Republick, who read them aloud. His Excellency then made his Speech to the Doge, and Signoria, in the English Language; and the Translation of it into Italian being read by a Secretary, the Doge answered it in a proper and polite Harangue. His Excellency was then conducted to his Palace by the Cavalier and Senators, who, after the same Ceremonies as the Day before, took their Leave. After the Departure of the Cavalier and Senators, his Excellency received Presents from the Republick of a magnificent Desert, and various Sorts of Wine and Provisions.

During the whole Time of the Ceremony, the Ambassador's Palace was open to every Body: In the Evenings it was finely illuminated; Concerts of Musick in several Rooms, and a Profusion of Refreshments of every Sort. His Excellency's State Boats, magnificently gilt, and adorned with emblematical Figures relating to the glorious Conquests Great Britain hath acquired during the Course of the late War, were made entirely new for the Occasion: The Liveries were more numerous and splendid than had ever been seen on a like Ceremony. His Excellency was attended in his Entry by several British Noblemen and Gentlemen; among whom were the Duke of Gordon, Lord William Gordon, Lord Warkworth, Earl of Maffarene, Sir Roger Mostyn, and Mr. Dundas; and his Excellency's Magnificence, Liberality and Politeness gave universal Content to all Ranks of People.

This Day the following Ordinance was published here.

By the King.

BE it known to all Men, that a good, firm, permanent, and solid Peace, with an entire and sincere Reconciliation, has been made and agreed upon between the Most High, Most Excellent, and Most Potent Prince Lewis, by the Grace of God, King of France and Navarre, our Sovereign Lord: The Most High, Most Excellent, and Most Potent Prince George, King of Great Britain, Elector of Brunswick-Lunenbourg: And the Most High, Most Excellent, and Most Potent Prince Joseph, King of

Portugal, and of the Algarves, their Vassals, Subjects, and Servants, in all their Kingdoms, Countries, Territories, and Lordships under their Obedience: That the said Peace is general between Them, and their said Vassals, and Subjects; and that by Means thereof, they are permitted to go, come, return, and sojourn in all the Places of the said Kingdoms, States, and Countries; to traffick, and carry on Trade, to hold Correspondence, and to have Communication with each other, and this, with all Liberty, Freedom, and Safety, as well by Land as by Sea, and on the Rivers, and other Waters, and the whole entirely in the same Manner as it has been, and ought to be practised, in Time of good, sincere, and friendly Peace, such as That which it has pleased the Divine Goodness to give to the said Lord the King, to the said Lord the King of Great Britain, Elector of Brunswick-Lunenbourg, to the said Lord the King of Portugal and of the Algarves, and to their People and Subjects. And in order to maintain them therein, it is most expressly forbidden to all Persons, of what Quality and Condition soever they may be, to undertake, attempt, or innovate any Thing to the contrary or to the Prejudice thereof, on Pain of being severely punished, as Violators of Peace, and Disturbers of the Publick Tranquillity. And to the End that no one may pretend Ignorance hereof, these Presents shall be read, published, and affixed where it shall be necessary. Done at Versailles the Third Day of June 1763. Signed Louis. And lower, the Duc de Praslin. And sealed with the Small Private Seal.

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and Representatives happen to live, in order to ob-
tain Administration or Probats of the Wills of such
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And whereas no Wages, due to Seamen as afore-
said, are legally or fairly paid, as the Law now
stands, in producing any Administrations not granted
by the Wills which have not been proved in, the
Prerogative Court of the Sec of Canterbury, held
at Doctors Commons, London: In order therefor,
to save unnecessary Trouble and Expence to such
Widows or Representatives, Notice is hereby given,
that they should not apply for any Wages due to the
Deceased, until they have taken out Letters of Ad-
ministration in the said Prerogative Court, and in no
other whatever.

And whereas the Widows and next of Kin of
Seamen are sometimes deterred from proving their
Wills and Administrations, by a Notion, that the Fees
and Expences attending the same are so large, that
it is not worth their While to entitle themselves to
receive Wages which amount only to small Sums.

Notice is hereby given, that the Charge at Doc-
tors Commons of taking Administrations or proving
the Wills, in common Form, of Seamen dying in the
Pay of His Majesty's Navy, by the Widows, Chil-
dren, Fathers, Mothers, Brothers or Sisters of such
Seamen where the Effects of the Deceased are under
the several Rates of Five Pounds, Twenty Pounds,
Forty Pounds, and Sixty Pounds, by Commissions
or otherwise, amount to no more than the respective
Sums particularly specified in the Table or Schedule
hereunder mentioned, Stamps Office and Proctors
Fees all included.
