**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Town Council of your Borough of Queensferry in Scotland, humbly

beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the Success that has attended your seasonable Endeavours to restore to your People the Blessings of Peace.

It is with great Pleasure and Satisfaction we see a War, founded in Justice and Necessity, and prosecuted with Vigour, at length terminated by a Treaty of Peace, the Equity and Moderation of which promise the fairest Prospect of its Continuance.

We earnestly pray, that the Peace now established may be as lasting as it is honourable; and that your Majesty may long live to enjoy the Fruits of that Repose you have so graciously procured for your Subjects, and reign with Glory and Happiness in the Hearts of an affectionate, loyal, and free People, undisturbed by the dark Designs of bad Men.

*Vienna, June 18.* Besides Twelve Saïques of three or four Cannons each, which are building here, and a Number of equal Force at Closter Neubourg, which are destined for Hungary, the Court have also sent to Italy for several Boat Builders, Shipwrights, &c. and Colonel Lanus is on the Point of setting out for that Kingdom, to raise a Battalion to serve on board the said Saïques.

*Ratisbonne, June 23.* The Magistrates of Wetzlar have sent their Deputy here an ample Memorial relating to a Military Execution made on that Town the latter End of last Month by the Troops of Hesse Darmstadt; with Orders to present it to the Minister of Mentz, to be carried to the Dictature, which cannot be done till the Election of an Arch-Bishop of Mentz has put an End to the Disputes concerning the Directory of the Empire. In the mean Time, a Letter from the Magistrates of Wetzlar to the College of Citys, dated the 7th Instant, is handed about; it contains nothing more than what has already been inserted in the Publick Papers, except, that after the Imperial Chamber had issued several Decrees against the Court of Darmstadt with regard to those Proceedings, the said Troops, after having reinforced that Part of the Garrison, which the Court of Darmstadt has a Right to keep there, had quitted the City the 31st of last Month, carrying with them to Giessen all the Persons they had taken up; where they were not only detained, but, in Disdain of the Imperial Decrees, condemned to work at the Fortifications. The Magistrates add, they were busy in Drawing up the Verbal Process relating to those Outrages, and in specifying their Grievances; after which they promise to give further Informations to the College of Citys.

*Lisbon, June 22.* His Portuguese Majesty about a Fortnight ago reviewed the four Regiments of Cascais, La Lippe, Estremos, and Aveiras, and signified his Royal Satisfaction, by promoting the Colonels, the Marquis de Lavradio, the Viscount de Mesquitella, Preston, and Count de Aveiras to the Rank of Brigadier-General.

The Court has received Advice by the Way of the Brazils, that when the Lord Clive Privateer, Capt. Macnamara, and his Conforts, arrived in the River of Plate, as also the Reinforcement sent by the Governor of the Rio de Janeiro, intended for Nova Colonia de Sacramento; finding the Place taken, they held a Council of War, and determined to attack it. Upon Landing their Men, they were met by a considerable Body of Troops; they routed these Troops, took some Officers Prisoners, and one Jesuit, eight Pieces of Cannon, and several Horses. They attempted the Town of Colonia de Sacramento, and would have carried it; but, during the Attack, Capt. Macnamara's Ship, by some unlucky Accident, took Fire, which obliged the Besiegers to quit their Enterprize. According to the same Advices, the Fleet from the Rio de Janeiro may be expected here by the Middle of next Month.

Whereas it frequently happens, that the Widows and Representatives of Sailors belonging to His Majesty's Service who die at Sea or in Foreign Parts, ignorantly apply to the Ecclesiastical Court of the Jurisdiction nearest to the Place where such Widows and Representatives happen to live, in order to obtain Administration or Probats of the Wills of such Seamen.

And whereas no Wages, due to Seamen as aforesaid, can legally or safely be paid, as the Law now stands, on producing any Administrations not granted by, or Wills which have not been proved in, the Prerogative Court of the See of Canterbury, held at Doctors Commons, London: In order therefore to save unnecessary Trouble and Expence to such Widows or Representatives, Notice is hereby given, that they should not apply for any Wages due to the Deceased, until they have taken out Letters of Administration in the said Prerogative Court, and in no other whatever.

And whereas the Widows and next of Kin of Seamen are sometimes deterred from proving their Wills and Administring, by a Notion, that the Fees and Expences attending the same are so large, that it is not worth their While to entitle themselves to receive Wages which amount only to small Sums.
