To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesse, and Principal Inhabitants of the City of Londonderry in the Kingdom of Ireland.

# May it please your Majesty,

W.E your Majefty's moft dutiful and loyal Suband Principal Inhabitants of the City of Londonderry, humbly beg Leave to offer to your Majefty, the moft fincere and cordial Affurances. of our unalterable Attachment to your Majefty's Perfon, and Government.

Convinced as we are of our Sovereign's gracious Attention, and Paterhal Regard to every Part of His Dominions, however remote from His Royal Prefence, we promife ourfelves, that your Majefty will favourably accept this Teffimony of Loyalty and Affection from the Citizens of your faithful City of Londonderry; who, animated with the fame Conflitutional Principles as our Illuftrious Mother the City of London, efteem it our Duty to declare our entire Satiffaction in the Wildom of your Majefty's Councils, and our grateful Senfe of the Advantages which you have procured for thefe your Kingdoms, in the Conclusion of a Glorious and Succesful War, by a Just and Honourable Peace.

At the fame Time, we cannot help expressing the deepest Resentment against every Attempt to lessen that Respect which is so justly due from Subjects to their Sovereign, or to alienate their Affections from a Prince who hath invariably made the Laws the Rule of His Government, and in so eminent a Manner confiders Himself as the Common Father of all His People.

Not lefs zealous than our Ancestors of this Place, for the Prefervation of our happy Confliction, and Liberties dearer to us than our Lives, we detest that factious Spirit which falsely affumes the Name of Patriotifm, but really tends to the Subversion of those Liberties which it pretends to affert; and are fully determined to exert ourselves, within our proper Sphere, in supporting, on all Occasions, even at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, your Majesty's just Prerogative, and the Honour and Dignity of your Crown.
