**T**HE following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses, and Principal Inhabitants of the City of Londonderry, having been transmitted to His Excellency the Earl of Northumberland, Lord Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty : Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses, and Principal Inhabitants of the City of Londonderry in the Kingdom of Ireland.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses and Principal Inhabitants of the City of Londonderry, humbly beg Leave to offer to your Majesty, the most sincere and cordial Assurances, of our unalterable Attachment to your Majesty's Person, and Government.

Convinced as we are of our Sovereign's gracious Attention, and Paternal Regard to every Part of His Dominions, however remote from His Royal Presence, we promise ourselves, that your Majesty will favourably accept this Testimony of Loyalty and Affection from the Citizens of your faithful City of Londonderry ; who, animated with the same Constitutional Principles as our Illustrious Mother the City of London, esteem it our Duty to declare our entire Satisfaction in the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, and our grateful Sense of the Advantages which you have procured for these your Kingdoms, in the Conclusion of a Glorious and Successful War, by a Just and Honourable Peace.

At the same Time, we cannot help expressing the deepest Resentment against every Attempt to lessen that Respect which is so justly due from Subjects to their Sovereign, or to alienate their Affections from a Prince who hath invariably made the Laws the Rule of His Government, and in so eminent a Manner considers Himself as the Common Father of all His People.

Not less zealous than our Ancestors of this Place, for the Preservation of our happy Constitution, and Liberties dearer to us than our Lives, we detest that factious Spirit which falsely assumes the Name of Patriotism, but really tends to the Subversion of those Liberties which it pretends to assert ; and are fully determined to exert ourselves, within our proper Sphere, in supporting, on all Occasions, even at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, your Majesty's just Prerogative, and the Honour and Dignity of your Crown.

May the same impartial Steadiness, which hath hitherto so remarkably distinguished your Majesty's mild and gracious Government, continue to surmount every Obstacle to the Publick Tranquility, and the repose of your Royal Heart ; and finally secure to your Majesty a long, happy, and glorious Reign over a loyal, affectionate, and united People.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in the County of Northumberland, the Towns of Newcastle upon Tyne, and Berwick upon Tweed, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the happy Conclusion of the late bloody and expensive War, by a Safe, Honourable, and Advantageous Peace ; a Peace, by which a great Multitude of Subjects, and many extensive Countries, capable of great Improvements, are added to the British Empire.

We hope that this great Increase of your Majesty's Dominions will, by the Blessing of God on your pious Endeavours, become an Occasion of the Enlargement of the Redeemer's Kingdom ; that many Nations, Strangers, as yet, to the Pleasures of polished Life, and to the Blessings of True Religion, will, in a little Time, be civilized and converted to the Christian Faith.

We embrace, with Pleasure, this Opportunity of assuring your Majesty, that, as it is our indispensable Duty, it shall be our constant Endeavour, to confirm our Hearers in their well-known Principles of Loyalty and steady Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government ; to warn them of the Guilt and Danger of Faction and Licentiousness ; to inspire them with a grateful Sense of the inestimable Blessings of civil and religious Liberty which we endure under your Majesty's equitable and mild Administration ; to engage them to join with us in most earnest Prayers to God, that your Majesty's Reign may be long,

long, peaceful, and glorious, over a free, happy, and united People; and that the British Crown may continue to flourish, with increasing Lustre, on the Heads of Princes of your Majesty's amiable Character, and illustrious Family, to the latest Ages.

*Ratibon*, June 26. Philip Stanhope Esq; His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Diet, arrived here Yesterday.

*Copenhagen*, July 2. A Danish Frigate, under the Command of Capt. Kaas, sailed the 24th past for the Coast of Barbary, having on Board the usual Presents for the Emperor of Morocco, and likewise a new Consul, Mr. Areboe, for Algiers.

On the 28th past a publick Thanksgiving was devoutly celebrated here, as well for the Restoration of Peace to Europe in general, as for the particular Preservation of It in these Dominions.

*Mentz*, July 5. This being the Day fixed for the Election of an Archbishop, the Chapter assembled in the Morning with the usual Solemnities, and unanimously chose Baron Breidbach of Burrisheim, Great Dean of the Chapter, Elector of Mentz.

*Hague*, July 8. The Prince of Orange goes Tomorrow to the House in the Wood, near this Town, for the Remainder of the Summer.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That some Person or Persons, unknown, did, in the Night-time, between the Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth Days of June last, at the Parish of the Holy Trinity in the County of the City of Exeter, in a Rack-Field there, called Fryershayes, wilfully and maliciously cut Five Serges called Half Quarters, of the Value of Eight Pounds, the Property of Ann Moor, of the Parish of the Holy Trinity in the said County of the City of Exeter, Fuller, then and there being on the Racks; and that some Person or Persons, unknown, did, also, in the Night-time, between the Second and Third Days of this Instant July, at the Parish aforesaid, and in the Rack-Field aforesaid, wilfully and maliciously cut Eight other Serges called Pieces and Half, of the Value of Twelve Pounds, the Property also of the said Ann Moor, then, and there, being on the said Racks; and also Four other Serges, likewise called Pieces and Half, of the Value of Six Pounds, then, and there, being on the Racks, the Property of Abraham Kennaway of the same Parish, Fuller; and that all the Serges so cut as aforesaid were thereby greatly injured, and so as not to be worth One Third Part of the Original Value: His Majesty, for the better Discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Committing the said Crimes, or either of them, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any One of them (except the Person who actually cut the said Serges) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
