*The Queen's Palace, St. James's Park,
August 16, 1763.*

THIS Morning about Ten o'Clock, the Queen was happily delivered of a Prince. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, being present.

This great Event was immediately made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns.

Her Majesty and the Young Prince are, God be praised, as well as can be expected.

Hamburgh, August 9. On Sunday last, the 7th Instant, the Princess of Holstein, Consort to Prince George, Stadtholder of Kiel, died here after a long and painful Illness.

Hague, August 12. The Prince of Orange sets out To-morrow Morning, to visit the Princess Dowager at Soesdyck.

Leicester House, August 9.

This Day the Chevalier D'Eon, Minister Plenipotentiary from France, had a Private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

Saville House, August 9.

This Day Count d'Einsiedel, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland;

And the Chevalier D'Eon, Minister Plenipotentiary from France;

Had Private Audiences of his Royal Highness the Duke of York; and afterwards the Chevalier D'Eon had a Private Audience of her Royal Highness Princess Augusta.

To all which they were introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.
