Naples; Sept. 24. Wo dayes fince, the Marquis de los Vélez took upon him the government, and yesterday gave his first Audiences. From Sicily we hear, that the French continue to fortifie themselves in Augusta, but that they begin to be straight-

ned for want o' water, which is cut off by the Spaniards. The Kings Palace here is preparing for the reception of Don Juan of Auffria, who, we are affured, will take his paffage hither in the Dutch Fleet, under the command of Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter. The Spanish Men of War continue ftill here, for want of weather fit to fuil.

Marfeilles, Oftob. 14. Three dayes fince arrived here our Fleet of Gallies, being 24 in number, and at the fame time 22 Men of War at Thoulon from Meffina, which place they left in a very good condition, and fufficiently furnished with Provisions, and all other Necefiaties: fo foon as they are refitted, which will not take up much time, they will, as we are told, return with freth fapplies to Meffina. By a Veffel arrived from Malth1, we have advice That Sir Fohn Narborough kaving been forced by bad weather to retike from before Tripoli, those Corfairs had taken that opportunity to put three of their Men to Sea, who had taken their courfe towards the Levant; of which Sir Fohn had no fooner advice, but be frue three Frigats after them.

Cadiz, Sept. 28. This morning came into our Bay Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter, with 12 Men of War.

Dantzick, Ollob. 5. Letters from Lemburgh, of the 20 palt, tell us. That the King of Poland intending to march the 15, for the relief of Podhais, received the day before the ill news of its furrender on condition that the Garifon and people in it might march away, who were in all above 1 2000 perfons ; but the barbarous Enemy did nor obseive the Capitulation, but made them all Prisoners, and plundered the Town, and then burnt it : upon advice of which, the King he d a Council of War, where feveral of the Senators dvifed his Majefty not to march wich fo few Forces against the Enemy ; but his Majefly declared that he could not fit ftill, and fee fo manypoor Christians carried into flavery: and on the 17, begun his march with an Army of about 15000 Men, direftly towards the Enemy. . We have likewife no very good news from the Ukraine, viz. that the Cofficks in Braflaw hive revolted, and deliver'd their Captain to Dorofensko General of the Rebel Cofficks.

³ Rostock, Ollob. 9. Here is at prefent a Danish Garifon; and the Commissivg General of Denmark is about creating a great Magazine here, to which, the Lading of a swedish Veffel which come from Riga in Livonia with Corn, and was lately taken, hath very much contributed. The King of Denmark has been ever fince the fixth inflant, with his Forces before Dengarten; and the Imperial and Brandenburgh Troops before Denmin, the two Paffes into Pomeren. The Danish Elect keeps its flation off of Riggen; and the Janish Elect keeps account of the Suedish Fleet being at Sea. From Ber in we have Letters of the fifth infl, which fay, that the 7th following, 3000 Men were to march from thence; under the command of the Prince of Anhalt, towards Stetin, and that he was to take with him feveral pieces of Cannon.

Hamburgh, Octob. 14. The Duke of Lunenburgh Zell has appointed a Rendezvous of his Forces at Harbarg, about four Leagues from hence, with which he will enter the Dutchy of Bremen, and join the Munfter and Brandenburgh Troops that are employed there against the Suedes, which he is to command in chief, as Director of the Circle of the Lower Saxony, and as being appointed by the Emperor, for the executing the Imperial Ban against the Suedes, for as much as concerns the Dutchy of Bremen; the Bishop of Munster has at prefent his relidence at Ottersborg, and his Troops beliege Buckhoede, a place of great importance. The fhips that lie before Carelstat, do no great good there ; and, it's faid, that they have quitted that enterprize. Two days fince, news was brought to Town, that the King of Denmark had taken Demgarien by ftorm, which needs a confirmation. Wifmar is quite blocked up on the fide of the Land.

Bremen, Octob. 16. The Munfter and Brandenburgh Troops are now before Buckboode, where they expect the Duke of Zell with his Forces, if the place be not taken before. This morning 1500 Men of the Confederates passed by here towards Carelfadt, to attack that place by Land.

Straburgh, Ollob. 11. The Prince of Conde has not yet changed his Camp, though we have for feveral dayes path had a difcourfe, that fo foon as he had received the reinforcements he expected, he would pais the *Rhine*, and enter into the Countrey of *Brifgon*; which feveral parties have already done, making ufe of the Bridge at *Brifac*, and have returned with good booty. It is faid, that the feveral Recruits which have come to the Prince of *Conde* fince his being encamped at *Kaltenboltz*, may in all make about 6000 Men. The Imperial Army lies ftill about Landaw.

spire, Ottob. 13. The Imperial Army continues to have its quarters at Offenbach, though we are in continual expectation to hear of its decamoment, in order to its paffing the Rhine, and going into Winter-quarters : in the interim General Montecuculi cofitinutes to fortifie feveral places for the blocking up of Philipsburgh; and the other day, General Vermuller was to obferve the feituation of the Fort belonging to that place on the o-Two dayes fince, the Prince of ther fide of the Rhine. Baden Dourlach paffed the Rhine at Lauterburg, with a commanded party of the Troops of the Circles. The Duke of Lorrain continues with his Troops in the Territories of the Duke of Deux Ponts towards I orrain ; it is faid he has at prefent with him, together with the Imperial and Munster Troops that were at the fiege of Treves, a Body of 8 or 9000 Men; and many people will believe, that his Highness will yet give the French fome diversion on that fide r' which, it feems, they apprehend, for that the Marefchal de Roche fort affembles what

force he can about Merz, to oppose him. Cologne, Octob. 15. The 10 inftant, Monsieur Ghauvet, Lieurenant-General of the Forces of the Duke of Lungen Lunenburgh, decamped from Woeringen with five Regiiments of Horfe and Foot, and went and lodged at Grimmelinhaufen, half a League from Nnis; the 13 inflant paffed the Rhine at Angeroort between Keyferfwert and Duysburg, and hath fince continued his march towards the Wefer. Two Lunenburgh Regiments, and the Troops of Ofnabrugh and Wolfembuttel, are ftill at Woeringen, where, it's faid, they will remain, till the return of the Count de Lippe with the Lunenburgh Cavalry, which not long fince joined the Prince of Oranges Army. The ninth inflant, the Marquis de Grana arrived from the Imperial Army at Bon, the 12 he came hither, and yetterday he went to vifit the Duke of Holffein, Marefchal de Camp of the Lunenburgh Troops at his quarters at Woeringen.

Brussels, Octob. 15. Our Army continues in its old quarters, but, according to our last advices from thence, his Highness intended to decamp as this day. On Friday last, his Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa went out with a party of Horfe, and from a little Hill took an account of the Enemies Army, which, according to their calculation, confifted in about 30000 Men. Yefterday 3 Dutch Regiments of Foot, part of those Troops that were fent under the command of the Rhingrave towards Tillemont, paffed by Ma ines, on their way towards the Countrey of Waes, to fecure it for the future against the incurfions of the French, though, it's faid, that those Inhabitants have made a private agreement with the French to pay them Contributions. From Liege they write, I hat the French continue to fortifie the Cittadel; and have caufed all the houfes that flood near it to be pulled down. Our Letters from Germany bring us not any thing new.

Ditto, Oftob. 18. The 15 inftant, about eight in the morning, our Army decamped from Hannut and Orp le Grand, and marched towards Warem; about Noon, the French appeared in their Rear, with defign, as was thought, to attack it : upon which, the Prince of Orange drew his Army up in Battalia, in a large Plain, to give the Enemy the opportunity of a Battel, in case they defired it, and continued some time in that poslure; but the Duke of Luxemburgh (for he himfelf was advanced with 10000 Horfe to observe our march) retiring a-gain, our Army continued its march, and lodged that ni ht at Warem, where his Highness took his leave of the Duke de Villa Hermofs, leaving the command of the Dutch Troops to the Count of Waldeck, under the faid Dake, and parted towards Louvain. The fame night the French Army came into he quarters we had quitted at Orp le Grand. The 16, our Army marched again, and encamped near St. Tron; and the Letters which came from th nee yesterday, fay, that they were then marching towards Leeuwe, where his Excellency intended to pals the River, and take his quarters between Leeuwe ard Dieft, being an enclosed Countrey, and where there is good Forage; and, is believed, the Army will reft there for some dayes, till the Winter-quarters are fetled. It is faid that the Dake of Lazemburgh is likewife retiring with his Army towards Charleroy, and, it feems, all parties are now difpofed to go isto Winter-quarters.

Ditte, Offeb. 22. Our Army is now feparated, and going into Winter quarters; most of the Dutch Regiments have passed the River at Dieft with the Artillery, and continue their moreh towards Holland; the rest of the Dutch Troops will take their quarters about Malines, till the French are wholly retired out of these Prowinces. The Spanish Troops are likewise going into quarters, and we expect our Governor the Duke de Villa Hermosa here in a day or two. We have Letters from Strathurgh of the 14, and from Spire of the 15, but

they tell us not any news; the Prince of Conde continuing at Kassenholtz, and the Imperial Army at Offenbach, where General Montesuculi was taken very ill of the Gout. The French Army marches back towards Charleroy.

Antwirp, Ollob. 18. The 15 inflant, the French made another incursion into the Countrey of Waes, where they burnt feveral houfes, and then retired again. The **56**, about Noon, arrived here his Highnefs the Prince of Orange, who that morning came from Leeuwe; and the Tide then ferving, his Highnefs went on board his? acht, without making any flay here, or receiving any Compliments, farther than the falute of the Guns at the Calile, and the other Forts; his Highneffes Guards marched by Land towards Bergen-op-zoom. The Armies, we hear, are in the mean time retiring into their Winter-quarters.

Amflerdam, Offob. 18. From Enckbuyfen we have advice, that the Capers of Dunkirk have taken above 40 of our Buffes, which they freed again for 1200 Gilders, with permiffion to continue to fifth three weeks.

Hague, Odob. 18. The 17 inflant, we received advice that the Prince of Orange had two dayes before left the Army under the command of the Duke de Vika Hermofa at Watern, and was on his return hither; and this day came hither. Ione of his Highnefts Domefticks, who tell us, That yefterday in the evening his Highnefs arrived at his houfe at So flanke, not far from hence: upon which, Prince Maurits of Naffaw, the Prince of Com land, the Heer Odyle and leveral other perfons of quality, are gone to pay theirRefpects to his Highnefs there, who is expected here on Monday or Tuefday next; and will be received by the Purghers in Arms, and with other extraordinary Solemnities. We are told, that on Saturday laft was figuee a new Treaty between this state, and he Bifhop of Manfter, which is to be effensive and defensive during this War, and defensive only after the fame fhall be ended, and by which the Bifhop is obliged to affit this State with 300 Mensbefides the poop he is to furnifh the Emperour. Monfieur Paets, late Ambaffador on the parts of this State at Madrid, is re-eltabunfhed in the place he had in the Magiffracy of Roireans. Dinto, Offob. 22.
