The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Kincardine.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Kincardine, beg Leave to present to your Majesty, this our humble Address upon the late great Event, by which your Majesty hath not only relieved your own Subjects from the grievous Burden of a most bloody and expensive War, but may be said, with greater Propriety than any other King of whom we read in History, to have given Peace to the whole Earth.

It is with the greatest Indignation and Abhorrence, that we see this so great and so general a Blessing, by the Arts of Faction, made the Pretence of an Opposition to the Government of our most gracious Sovereign, by whose Wisdom and Moderation it was procured; and this Opposition brought Home even to the Throne itself, with a Petulance and Virulence of which the most factious Times hardly furnish an Example: We can with great Confidence assure your Majesty, that those most unbecoming Reflections, which have been thrown out by ill designing Men, will only tend to strengthen and confirm our inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, being persuaded that such Men, to accomplish their own private Ends would not hesitate to bring about the greatest national Mischief, even the dividing the Two Kingdoms united by the most solemn Treaty, and by every Bond of mutual Interest.

May your Majesty's Reign be long and prosperous, over a free and united People, extremely happy in the best of Sovereigns.

*Dresden, August 7.* The 3d of this Month being the Anniversary of his Polish Majesty's Name-Day, he was pleased to give the Order of the White Eagle of Poland to Count Charles de Bruhl, Second Son of his Excellency Count de Bruhl, to Count Poiniski, to the Bishop of Smolensko, M. de Hoven, Chancellor of Courland, and to another Gentleman.

This Day the Assembly of the States was opened with the usual Ceremony of the King's receiving the Deputies and Members, sitting on his Throne; when Count Rex, as First Minister of the Conference, made them a most pathetic and elegant Speech; after which the Propositions from the Court to the Diet were read. The Office of Marshal is filled, during the Minority of the Hereditary Marshal Count Loeser, by M. de Hopegarden, who has acquired universal Approbation by the Answer he made, in the Name of the States, full of Respect to the King, and promises to comply with the Demands of the Court in as ample a Manner as the present distressed Condition of the Country will permit.
